A Word from the Pastor

"At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, 'Who, then, is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?' He called a little child to him, and placed the child among them. And he said: 'Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Therefore, whoever takes the lowly position of this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. And whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me."

Matthew 18:1-5

As a parent with young children in the house, September is always a defining month on my family's calendar. September, to me, marks the end of summer because vacations are mostly over or are ending, everybody's heading back to work, school's back in session, lunches must be packed, homework must be done; it is a month that signals that the "freeness" of summer is over and we are back to our daily routine. But, more than that, looking at my daughter Hailey and all that she is doing as she starts a new year of school reminds me of what it was like when I was a child and attending school. I remember the first few weeks of every year and how excited I was to meet my new teachers, see my friends again, and just generally be back in a routine that I was comfortable with.

And, as I am reflecting upon my childhood memories, I can't help but be drawn to this passage from Matthewwhere Jesus tells His disciples that they must be like little children in order to enter the kingdom of heaven. But, what



does that mean? What is Jesus telling us that we need to do? He means that we are to be like little children in their humility and their lack of concern for their social status. You see, in the culture into which Jesus is teaching, children are seen more as property than they are as valuable members of society; they will grow to be that one day, sure, but they are not there yet. Children in Jewish society were of no importance, subject completely and totally to the authority of their elders. Jesus knew then, and he knows now, that it is not in our nature to humble ourselves and take a low place among our peers; we will not easily take an inferior position.

But, Jesus calls us to take such a position nonetheless because He Himself took such a position. When He held up the little child in this passage as an example, He did so in response to the disciples' question about who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Well, we all know the answer to that question is Jesus Himself, He is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven; yet, when He came to this earth, He did so as a lowly carpenter, and His ministry was defined by the way that He served others. He wasn't concerned about His own status or how other people perceived Him, He only cared about getting to the work of advancing His Father's kingdom on earth.

As summer winds to a close, and we all get back to the daily routines of life, whether we are in school, working, or retired, let's all do our best to remember that Jesus calls us to be humble like children, to lower ourselves to a position of humility, graciousness, and servitude. It too often seems in the 21st century that we are defined by how much we accomplish, how much we stand out from the crowd; we are defined by promotions we receive at work, the amount of money we make, the cars that we drive, the size of the house we live in, etc. We are very rarely defined by what we do for others and how we serve the people of our communities.

My prayer for the Church of the 49ers as we head into the fall is that we will all be like little children. That we will be defined by the fact that we are people who care about, and serve our community, not for our own sake, but for the sake of Jesus Christ. Let us remember in all that we do, we are to be humble and gracious because our Savior was humble and gracious when He walked this earth. Let us not get caught up in the "rat-race" of life, but focus on how we can better serve others and how God can use our servitude as an instrument to lead people into a saving relationship with Him through Jesus. We can have no higher calling than the calling to be lowly.

May the blessings of the Father and the peace of the Son be with you,

August Session Highlights

Highlights of the August 28th Session meeting include:

- Approved the History Committee's request to order Catalogit software as part of their project to make the Church of the 49ers archives a searchable database.
- *** Pastor Keith received unanimous approval by Presbytery to be ordained as a reverend and installed as our called pastor. The Ordination/Installation event has been scheduled for Sunday, October 13, at 4 pm in the sanctuary, with a reception to follow in Faith Hall.
- Still seeking a paid Wedding Coordinator. See ad on Page 8.
- Pastor Keith Reid and Jim Brandt will be our voting commissioners at the ECO synod meeting to be held in Dallas, TX in February 2020.
- It was decided that Faith Hall will not be a Polling Place for the November election because voting will take place over three days instead of one. We will be a ballot drop-off location, however.
- As a cost-saving measure, Session voted to reduce the number of domain names for the church website.
- In an effort to reduce the possibility of water incursion again in the Lower Sanctuary (North wall), the B&G Committee is seeking bids for new gutters and to install a French drain across the front of the bell

tower. Also, they are seeking bids for a contractor to refurbish the bell tower exterior on the East and South sides, and considering the feasibility of adding solar panels to the Faith Hall roof to reduce/ eliminate our utilities bill. Two windows on the North wall of the office building are being replaced.

- Dean Cunningham and Leslie Davis are re-creating the year-round Stewardship Committee, defunct since Barbara Lashbrook ran it so capably.
- Christian Education: Seeking a leader for the Women's Bible Study. Approved purchase of a subscription to kidssundayschool.com for materials for children's Sunday School. Working to pipe in the audio of the worship service to the Ramont Room so that the children's Sunday School can relocate there, a safer area for the children.
- Pastor Keith and the Welcome & Evangelism Committee are gathering names of individuals for an Inquirers' Class, not yet scheduled.

The next Session meeting will be on September 25, 2019, at 2:00 pm in the Lower Sanctuary, and members are welcome to attend. Check with the Office first for the correct start time and location.

Helen Johnson Community Dinners

Monday nights continue to be very busy in Faith Hall. Each and every week our committee works to provide a dinner for members of our community. We serve an average of 75-85 people each week, and often have leftovers for some guests to take home.

Our typical Monday begins around 1:00, when there is last minute shopping to be done, especially for fresh produce and last minute needed items. We try and open the hall at 2:00 pm. During the next four hours we are busy cleaning, preparing and cooking the dinner. Some of our guests now come about this same time and help with set up, wrapping silver and organizing our bread and other donated items. After dinner we have folks who help with the clean-up which includes dishes, washing down tables, stacking chairs and cleaning up the kitchen. We usually lock the door behind us about 7:30-7:45...Yes it is a busy day, but so very rewarding and a joy to those who serve.

We try and vary the protein of our meals, and have begun shopping a little wiser, by taking advantage of weekly sales and freezing the meat. Ground meat is probably the main meat, but we also use chicken, pork, tuna and cheese in various recipes... Most every week we have a fresh green salad (including tomatoes, carrots, spinach, cucumbers, and more) and this is a favorite for many guests. Rolls and desserts are most often donations from Safeway, but we try to have ice cream on occasion, as this is a big treat for many!

Beginning on September 9th, Columbia College students from the culinary department will once again be joining our team under the leadership of Renee Woolf. Many of you will remember Renee as she has been working with us for about two years. We are lucky to have her, as she has amazing talents in the kitchen and loves working with our team and for our church. Various college students will be with us on Monday evenings also, and they will be earning community service credit needed at the college. Please welcome them when you see them in the hall...They have black aprons that were purchased by their organization to identify them.

Each and every week Alex and Bethany Kash provide music for all of us at the dinner. They often come early to visit and even help us when there is a need. This is a wonderful addition for all of us, and on occasion you may even see folks singing along or dancing a bit.

We invite you all to come and visit us on a Monday night...you won't be sorry! And of course, if you are interested in helping out, please let us know.

News from Allen Graham, Missionary

Happy September Church of the 49ers family! It was so good to be with you in person last month and be able to share an update on the work of Reach Beyond.

This past week I finally received notice that the in-car test for my Spanish driver's license will be on September 24 at 2:30 pm. That's at 5:30 am in California, so if you're not an early riser, please pray the night before.

Let's praise God together for the first anniversary of our online Arabic media ministry. As I shared with you in my report on August 25, the response continues to be very good and new programs are being added to the programming. Here are some comments that came from listeners in August:

From North Africa: "After four years, my fiancée broke off our engagement. I had really rough time, became desperate, confined within myself, and one question raised 'why did this happen to me?' However, after contacting your team, I realized that God did not create us to live a desperate life, but He wants us to be successful and joyful. I realized how He loves me and I accepted Jesus Christ as my personal savior. I am happy and have hope."

From one of the gulf countries: "I am scared and do not feel safe to face God at the judgment day, feeling remiss. But when I contacted you, I realized how God loves me and that He knows me by name, wants to build a relationship with me built on love and not fear. I accepted Jesus Christ as my personal savior and have peace in my heart."

From North Africa: "I hate my life; nobody loves me, when I get close to anyone he just rejects me. This causes me psychological issues. I do not enjoy my life and do not have hope."

Please be praying for the team members who follow-up with each listener contact. The answers are usually not easy. The team members need God's wisdom and the leading of the Holy Spirit as they respond.

Praise God that this past week our region received the green light for a plastic recycling project called Trash 2 Treasure. We will begin work on this near the end of 2019 and into 2020. The project has great potential for applications in other regions of Reach Beyond, especially where we are working with refugee populations.

Thank you for coming alongside me with your prayers and financial gifts. What a privilege and blessing to serve together with you.


