A Word from the Pastor

"Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, left the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing during those days, and at the end of them he was hungry. The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, tell this stone to become bread.' Jesus answered, 'It is written: "Man shall not live on bread alone." The devil led him up to a high place and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And he said to him, 'I will give you all their authority and splendor; it has been given to me, and I can give it to anyone I want to. If you worship me, it will all be yours.' Jesus answered, 'It is written: "Worship the Lord your God and serve him only."' The devil led him to Jerusalem and had him stand on the highest point of the temple. 'If you are the Son of God,' he said, 'throw yourself down from here. For it is written: "He will command his angels concerning you to guard you carefully; they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone."' Jesus answered, 'It is said: "Do not put the Lord your God to the test."' When the devil had finished all this tempting, he left him until an opportune time." Luke 4:1-13 NIV

On Wednesday, February 26, we celebrated Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the season of Lent; and, since many Christians in the 21st century only celebrate this traditional liturgical season because that's what they have always done or because they feel like that's what they are supposed to do,



I wanted to take some time to explain to you what Lent is and why we observe it. I think that this is very important because we should be entering into any type of worship because we want to know, and be closer to God; not because it's what we think we are supposed to do or it's what our parents made us do when we were growing up. If we are going to observe the season of Lent, it's important to know what it means and why we do the things we do in its observance so that time of fasting to take your attention we can use them as ways to know and be closer to God.

Lent is the observance of the 40 days, not including Sundays, leading up to Easter Sunday. The reason that the church observes 40 days, as you may have guessed from the above passage, is because Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness being tempted by Satan. The word Lent itself is derived from the Anglo -Saxon word for "springtime," probably due to the time of year that it is observed. During the Lenten season, Christians spend time in prayer, fasting, and giving. We pray during Lent specifically to repent of our sins and to receive God's mercy and love.

Fasting, then, is probably what most people in the 21st century associate with Lent. I know that, even in high

school and college, I would hear people asking something along the lines of "what are you giving up for Lent?" And this fasting doesn't necessarily have to be, and oftentimes isn't, connected to food. Some people might do a more traditional fast like giving up meat or sweets. But some might do something like giving up their daily Starbucks, or Day -O coffee, giving up scrolling social media like Facebook or Twitter, giving up watching TV, etc. But, whatever a person decides to give up for Lent, the point of doing it is two-fold. First, you are, in an extremely small way, making a sacrifice as a way to remind you of Christ's sacrifice for you. Second, you are using this away from whatever thing you are fasting from, and instead focusing it on God; the time of fasting is meant to be a time where your relationship with your Creator and Lord grows ever deeper.

Giving, or self-sacrificing, whether that is giving money, giving of your time through volunteering, or doing something else good for others during the Lenten season is a way for us to respond to God's generosity to, and love for us, by showing that same generosity and love to others.

The reason that many Christians do these things during the 40 days before Easter is because it can make Christ's sacrifice and His resurrection and victory much more real and poignant when we remember those things on Good Friday and Easter Sunday, respectively. These observances during the Lenten season are not requirements, they are not commanded anywhere in Scripture, but they can enhance and deepen our respect, love, and admiration for Jesus and what He accomplished on our behalf

those 2000 or so years ago. It is not necessarily important what you fast from, for example, nor is it even really important that you fast; what is important is that you spend time during the Lenten season in reflecting on the love God has for you, the sacrifice Christ made for you, and that you focus on how you can strengthen and deepen your relationship with Him.

Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness being tempted by Satan so that He would know exactly what we all have to endure in this sinful world; He spent 40 days being tempted in the wilderness so that He could be the sinless, perfect sacrifice to atone for our sins. So, why can't we spend AT LEAST 40 days focusing solely and specifically on Him and how we can serve Him better in this world?

Pastor Keith has accepted the position of Vice Moderator of Presbytery, and after two years will be elevated to Moderator.

Pastor Keith Reid and Elder Jim Brandt attended the National Gathering of ECO in Dallas, TX in January and reported it was a great experience. With about 1500 others, they worshipped two to three times each day, listened to keynote speakers, and attended break out sessions.

The 2020 Nominating Committee will begin work to find new Elders and

Deacons to replace those finishing their terms the end of June.

Regarding Faith Hall rentals, the Elders voted to require that evening events end by 10:00 pm going forward. Also, along with other clean up chores, renters will be responsible for at least spotmopping the Faith Hall floor.

Keith was granted vacation time off March 9-16, and Pastor Lee will preach in his stead on March 15.

Their first class, after three years of study, graduated 27 students. A second class just began with 40 participants.

Suzanne reported on the Monday Night Dinners and we agreed to transfer money from the mission account to help with their amazing efforts.

We are looking forward to seeing Allen Graham on March 8. Because of the generosity of church members and additional money from the mission committee, we will be able to present a check to him to help support his wonderful missionary work.

Our committee continues to work with Columbia Elementary School to assist the students and their families with needed clothing and supplies.

News from Allen Graham, Missionary

Greetings Church of the 49ers family! I ended my January update with a challenge to share Christ with at least one person. Were you able to do so?

Last month, I told you about the Moria Camp refugee center in Lesvos, Greece. Reach Beyond has been cooperating with churches (from the United States, New Zealand and the United Kingdom) to help provide medical care, food distribution, relief programs for traumatized women and programs for the children, among other things. On one of the trips, our team observed that 188 pallets of bottled water were handed out each day. Each pallet contained 504 bottles for a total of 9,072 bottles per day! Although some of these bottles are reused as milk containers, most are discarded, and many end up in the creek beside the camp.


In response, our Reach Beyond engineers are piloting a program to provide the ability to recycle the plastic bottles that will reduce waste in the camp as well as potentially provide a means for the refugees to produce useful household items, construction materials and possible products for sale. The pilot program will be set up in Spain, where the manuals and training will be developed, and people will learn how to set up and run the equipment. Spain is the ideal place as we are able to legally sponsor the trainees into the country and the equipment is easily shipped in from other European countries. I am excited about this new program and appreciate your prayers.

I have told you before about a ministry partner who started a new FM station eight months ago. This station covers a large area of people

who speak various different languages. Some of the area that it reaches is in a war-torn region that desperately needs to hear the word of God. The stations are located in a country where there are 8,000 Christians in a population of 85 million people. Our partner stations reach a quarter of the country's population. We are praising God that the station was finally granted permission to transmit in the different languages of the people who can hear their signal.

This new station, its studios and its repeater are located in remote areas where the electricity can go off up to 50 times a day. The major radio and television stations, even the government facilities, do not have generators. We are praising God that the Lord has provided two generators to serve the studios and main transmitter site. We are praying for the funds for one more generator so that our partner will have an uninterrupted voice in the area; speaking hope, truth and love into the cars and homes of listeners, even when all the other stations are silent.

Editor's Note:

This is the first in a series of articles highlighting the various ministries/committees of the Church of the 49ers.

Highlighting the History Committee

As early as 1990, church member Ron Lambert felt the unoccupied white house on the corner of Jackson Street and Parrotts Ferry Road would be a convenient meeting site for 49er Church committees. Since it was approaching condemnation, nothing happened. Eventually, it was the incentive to organize a church history committee. Beginning in July 1991 a small but active group met in the Sadie Nicholls Room for several years, and the church's historic records were stored in the small damp "vault," a storage closet underneath the church office.

In the early 2000's, the records were moved to the basement of the sanctuary, and a Mission Statement was adopted: "The purpose of the History Committee of the Presbyterian Church of Columbia is to preserve and maintain for future generations the archives of the church and to develop projects that will convey to the community the rich church heritage dating from the middle of the 19th century."

The Committee has sponsored social events that were fundraisers used to offset some of the outstanding mortgage on Faith Hall, with a portion going to the building fund. For five years this involved an Ice Cream Social, and in 2013 the Committee put on a very successful Spaghetti Feed.

In 2015 the Archives were relocated to two rooms upstairs in Faith Hall (over the front porch), where researchers and technicians organized the extensive collection.

The committee is grateful to Pat Federly, with assistance from husband Ron, who scanned and catalogued more than

half of the stored artifacts in the Archives.

Both Federlys were especially instrumental in creating the Pastors' Wall display in Faith Hall before they moved away in 2018. Pat compiled the list of all the pastors of this church, including the called pastors, missionaries, stated supply pastors and student pastors who have served the Columbia

congregation since its inception in 1854; and Ron built the framework for the display. Below is an image of the Pastors' Wall following its dedication in 2017, with some of the History Committee members (left to right): Dick Dyer, Leslie Davis, Steve Ames, Ron and Pat Federly, and Darrol Davis.

By 2019, a committee Vision Statement included an outreach to a larger community. It reads: "Our vision is to share with Presbyterians and friends our influential and unique Mother Lode heritage as it continues to enrich our lives and communities." It is with enthusiasm that we foresee the extension of the heritage of the First Presbyterian Church of Columbia to an interested audience locally and to others in the distant communities. To that end, the Committee's current major project is to create a searchable database of the materials in our Archives.

Over the years various popular projects have been sponsored by the History Committee, including:

- Displays in the sanctuary and Faith Hall
- Golden Nugget newsletter articles
- Pulpit talks
- Heritage Sunday
- Oral history interviews with senior church members
- Lectures
- Socials
- Union Democrat articles

The Committee works closely with its equivalent at the Columbia State Historic Park, the City of Sonora, and the Tuolumne County Historical Society.

The History Committee is always open to new members. Any member of the congregation with an interest in history, or one who would like to know more about the history of our church specifically is invited to join us. The History Committee typically meets the first Monday each month at 9:30 am in the Ramont Room. For more information, contact the committee leaders, Darrol Davis and Dick Dyer.

Columbia's Birthday Celebration March 27


