


A Word from the Pastor

"For whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes." **1 Corinthians 11:26**

For Lent, I gave up my Google news feed. I made that decision because I was spending too much time scrolling through it and reading article after article. It's scary how quickly Google figures out what I like to read, and gets it right to me. For instance, when I was watching *The Crown*, I used Google search to check on some of the history being presented. Guess what, my Google news feed started showing lots of articles about the British royal family. I don't think that was a coincidence!

I wonder whether it's a good thing to have news tailored specifically for me, or anyone else. If we all have our own separate news feeds, with only those things on it that we like, then how can we know what's true? For instance, I might read an article saying that eggs are good for you no doubt because Google figured out that I like eggs. You might read an article saying that eggs are bad for you, and maybe that's because Google figured out that you don't like eggs. So which is it? We have no way to decide whether eggs are good or bad. And we can't even discuss it because we each have different information about eggs, and no way to know which information is true. We can't come to any agreement if we don't know what's true.



So I am very glad that God doesn't tailor the news for us! God doesn't tell us only what we want to hear, nor does he leave out what we don't want to hear. God tells us the truth, and asks us to adjust ourselves to what is true. The story of who God is and what he has done, shapes us. We don't shape God's story to our preferences. We allow God's story to shape us.

Holy Week is the best opportunity we have to immerse ourselves in God's story, and allow his story to shape us. During the four services of Holy Week (Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter), we read our way through the whole story as presented by one of the Gospel writers. For instance, this year we'll be reading through Luke 19 – 24, and responding to what we hear through prayer, song and sacrament.

We'll cover Luke 19 on Palm Sunday, Luke 22 on Thursday, Luke 23 on Friday, and Luke 24 on Easter Sunday. I encourage you to come to all the services, because the combined impact of the whole story is much greater than just parts of it.

I've read through the story of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, conflict with religious

leaders, betrayal, arrest, torture, death, and resurrection, many times. You probably have too. Yet the story never fails to move me. It shapes me with the depth of God's love for me in Jesus. It surely has the power to move you and shape you as well, if you will allow that to happen.

God's story changed the world. How about allowing God's story – the whole story - to change you?

- Roger and Judy Haughton recently visited the devastation in Paradise in the hopes of setting up a mission trip. They said that gift cards to Safeway, Target, Walmart, gas stations, etc. are a very useful donation we can send for the Camp Fire victims as they try to rebuild their lives and homes.
- Regarding the upcoming Yard Sale of Biblical Proportions, a Friday evening "Preview Night" on August 23rd with \$5 tickets was approved. It was also approved to use a vacant room in the Christian Education building for the purpose of storing yard sale items as they are collected.
- The Deacon liaison's report included the request for church members/friends to offer rides to our homebound members for their doctor appointments, etc.

Emergency Preparedness

Guest speakers for the PW March meeting were two young ladies from the Tuolumne County Public Health Department, who described the 30 programs the agency administers for the benefit of our citizens. Here's some advice they gave us for emergency preparedness:

- Sign up for Citizen Alert on your phone
- Follow the TC Health Department on Facebook
- Put a list of your medications in your wallet, and always keep a 7-day supply on hand
- Write down important phone numbers
- Test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors every month, or at least twice per year
- Meet your neighbors
- Make up emergency kits: a "shelter in place" kit for your home, a "go" kit for your home, and a kit for your vehicle
- Make a family emergency plan: Assign a contact person who lives 1-2 hours away, and tell everyone in the family to contact that person to report in after a disaster
- Purchase N95 or N100 face masks (respirator for smoky fires) available at Lowe's

Vets Helping Vets

The mission committee voted to donate \$500.00 to Vets Helping Vets. This is a local non-profit, which was established specifically for assisting our local veterans and their families who are struggling. At the facility, veterans can get information on programs and services available in Tuolumne County or be able to talk to a fellow vet. At the center is a "civilian free zone" so vets are able to discuss challenges in a safe, non-judgmental environment. Access to computers and printers are provided at no cost as well as support in finding jobs. Vets Helping Vets has a thrift store, located at 14348 Cuesta Court in Sonora (off Tuolumne Road) which accepts donations and supports their program.

Camp Fire Victims

Roger spoke to an administrator at **Bidwell Presbyterian Church in Chico** regarding the current needs in Paradise. He was told that gift cards to such places as Safeway, Target, Walmart and gas stations were needed. The committee voted to approve the purchase of eight \$50.00 gift cards. Roger called the Oroville Hope Center and signed up to volunteer at their warehouse on March 26. We spent three hours doing inventory on their supplies. While there, we spent time with Edward Wright, a Camp Fire survivor who lost everything. He has recently returned to the area and is working for the Hope Center and also helps with the clean up in Concow and Paradise. Edward told us that the need for each person is different as more and more people return to the area. The major distribution centered is moving from Oroville to Paradise. In the afternoon, we drove through Paradise. Most of the debris and especially the burned cars remain, although work was being done to clean up. In the downtown area, it was mind-boggling to see one building completely

destroyed and the one next to it completely untouched.

We visited Bidwell Church and gave them the gift cards, which will be distributed to victims from the fire. They were extremely grateful for our contributions. We will stay in touch with the Oroville Hope Center and possibly plan another trip once they are established in Paradise.

Columbia Elementary School

Our church made a donation to Columbia Elementary School to a fund which specifically helps with student needs. Tina Cruz, a counselor at the school, told us that she recently purchased two full outfits and personal hygiene products for a young student. The clothes she was wearing didn't fit, were torn and stained. She was struggling to come to school because she was embarrassed. This simple gesture has renewed her confidence. Also, head lice treatment kits were purchased and given to some families so that their children could return to school. What a blessing your generosity has been to the children in our own neighborhood!

Our next meeting will be April 23 at 3:00 in the lower sanctuary. Chris Lytle will be at our next meeting with an update on Spiritual Roads. Anyone is welcome to attend.

History Committee

From the Archives: The Mariners


My College Dictionary describes the word "Mariner" as one of those who is responsible for navigating a ship. However, we need to elaborate on this description to determine how it relates to our 49er Church Mariner Committee. To me, it suggests a conscientious "crew" assisting God's ministers with spiritual guidance as they contend with the "rocks and shoals" of life, and eventually delivering them to their GLORY (Psalms 74:24).

In retrospect, miniature sailing ships were visible relics in various Protestant churches; today they are still admired in a few historic Scandinavian churches. Additionally, "Mariner" was used as part of some church names including early American fishing villages along the East Coast, and also even a few inland communities. (In the Far West, "Prairie Schooner" seems to be preferred.) A few nautical phrases come to mind when describing the Mariner sailing ships: Skipper, First Mate, Log Keeper, Look Out, Chaplain, Ship Mates (of course, Jesus Christ was the vigilant pilot). In Columbia after the 49er Church Mariners were organized in 1958, the church "ship mates" are familiar to some elders today: the Salels, Guhls, Butterfields, Critchfields, Whites and others (husbands and wives signed on as a unit).

The home berth anchorage of the 49er Church Mariners was Ramont Hall, next to the sanctuary. (Recall, this was the only "spiritual ship" serving the community from the Gold Rush to the Millenium.) When the Great Fire of 1950 destroyed the 49er Church, only the tiny Youth Center remained; it was a roughhewn retreat built during the Depression Years as a gathering place for church boys and girls and occasionally small groups of adults. Although far from being weatherproof, it became the forerunner of a larger hall under con-

struction after the fire of 1950. Until 1954 when the new sanctuary was completed, the hastily constructed Ramont Hall became the 49er Church's manse, sanctuary, business office, social hall and even a community center. It was a popular meeting place for young and old of the congregation and their friends.

Through the years, many groups scheduled their activities in Ramont Hall; this article features the 49er Church Mariners Club (original name). Most meetings began with a Ringing of the Bell (this miniature ship bell below is now in our archives).




The Mariners provided financial support for others: 49er Thrift Shop in Sonora, church seminars, youngsters attending Calvin Crest's camps, missionaries, church buildings and grounds maintenance, and selected worthy activities.

However, what usually was admired by church and community seniors was the gastronomical delicacies. At the beginning of a banquet usually organized by a "Mariner Watch," Ramont Hall was transformed into an awesome showcase: flowers, antiques, colorful table decorations, also friendly faces and always a heavenly aroma from the nearby kitchen. During my research I discovered a slip of paper stating 300 people were served at one community festival. We do know that as many as 90 guests were in attendance in the hall on a special occasion (authorities stated the hall could safely accommodate 80; I do not know if the aging hall protested with grunts and groans but I did notice some settling of the rough flooring). The Mariner ladies and a few gents provided dishes from favorite family and historic recipes. Some are now preserved in "The 49er Cookin' Book (published in 1968).

One more component has been added to the Ephraim Project, our Social Media outreach into several unreached


people groups. There are now a total of four components. Praise God for how He is using new technologies to reach into closed countries and cultures.

After continuing my research of our records, it became evident that the Mariners were not only enriched through worship of the Lord, but also looked forward to special events as did Jesus. We have discovered that "Mariner Cruises" enticed local food connoisseurs to join friends attending full-house gatherings at the Clarks (Hawaiian Luau), Muses (Incredible Italian Spaghetti), McClearys (Potluck Picnic), 49er Church Banquets (a Mariners idea) and other community celebrations.

In Ramont Hall on Sabbaths, weekdays and summers, volunteers provided biblical messages, treats and innovative crafts for as many as 100 enthusiastic youngsters. Scheduled worship and entertainment was enjoyed by church and community families during the year, but especially at the annual Christmas and Easter services. Vacationing church groups from the Valley arrived in historic Columbia to experience the spectacular Mother Lode. Snow groups were anxious to play in the winter wonderland. After they arrived, accommodations were provided at the 49er Church; girls used Ramont Hall as a dormitory while the boys bedded down in their sleeping bags in the basement of the nearby sanctuary. Theater Arts students from the College of the Pacific (original name) frequently used the Church of the 49ers facilities while rehearsing at Columbia's Fallon House for their always popular stage productions. (One student reminded us that he would never sleep in the ancient Fallon House – "too many ghosts and eerie sounds at night.") 
