A Word from the Pastor

"Let everyone be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God. Consequently, whoever rebels against the authority is rebelling against what God has instituted, and those who do so will bring judgment on themselves. For rulers hold no terror for those who do right, but for those who do wrong. Do you want to be free from fear of the one in authority? Then do what is right and you will be commended. For the one in authority is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for rulers do not bear the sword for no reason. They are God's servants, agents of wrath to bring punishment on the wrongdoer. Therefore, it is necessary to submit to the authorities, not only because of possible punishment but also as a matter of conscience. This is also why you pay taxes, for the authorities are God's servants, who give their full time to governing. Give to everyone what you owe them: If you owe taxes, pay taxes; if revenue, then revenue; if respect, then respect; if honor, then honor." Romans 13:1-7

With all of the discussion regarding governmental overreach in these days of COVID-19, specifically the disagreements regarding the mandatory wearing of masks, I felt that it was important to explain to you the reasons why I, and the Session, have made the decisions that we have made regarding following



all of the orders issued by the governor. I'm not writing this article as a way to justify our decisions or to call out anyone who is against the mandatory wearing of masks; rather, I am writing this as a matter of explanation for why we have made the decisions we made.

Let me start off by saying that, personally, I am not in favor of our government mandating that we wear masks any time that we are in public; however, when I go out in public I put my mask on every single time. Why would I do that, you might ask. The reason that I do that is because of the passage at the beginning of this article; I do it because Scripture commands that we submit to the governing authorities. Paul does not mince words in this passage, he tells us that anyone who rebels against the governing authorities is rebelling against God; and I certainly don't want to get into the business of rebelling against God!

As Christians, we are not called to agree with everything our leaders do, we are not even called to *like* our leaders; but we are called to pray for them and to respect the authority that they have been given. Basically, God is telling us that, unless our government issues a law, order, or mandate that directly

violates His Word, we are to submit to their authority and follow what has been issued. It may rub us the wrong way, we may not enjoy doing it, but we are called to do so nonetheless. God is a God of peace and love, not a God of disharmony and rebellion. Yes, there are certainly times where we need to stand up for the Truth of His Word, and if that causes rebellion and disharmony then that's what it takes. But, being required to wear masks when we are in public is not violating Scripture, it's not violating God's Will; so, is it something that we should be rebelling against? I submit to you that it is not.

So, when our Session made the decision to make masks mandatory in our Sunday worship, we were not doing it because we are living in fear, or because we are following fake news and media hype; we did it because our duly elected governor ordered it, and Scripture tells us that we are to submit to his authority, even if we don't necessarily like or agree with him. We made masks a requirement not because we believe everything we see and hear in the media, not because we are living in fear, but because we are trying to be the best Christians we can be and follow the whole counsel of Scripture.

Singing Exercises During the Pandemic

It looks like it'll be a long time before it's safe for the 49er Choir to rehearse and then sing for the congregation. Because the COVID-19 virus is being spread through coughing and sneezing and breathing out,... singing is not safe. And it doesn't work behind a mask.

Some of us are being reminded that if you don't use your singing voice, you lose your singing voice. It's all about muscles, and they need to be exercised. AND with this isolation, especially if you live alone, your speaking voice is suffering too. I'm using a prescription for that, and you might enjoy it too. It is Two Hymns a Day (THAD).

I suggest warming up with several repeats of "Happy Birthday" to start up those vocal muscles. You can do that as you make your bed in the morning or clean up after breakfast!

Then how about "Be Thou My Vision" a few times through. If you like, you can sing with YouTube (I suggest youtube.com/watch? v=ZyFu0rl58qQ). See three verses to the right.

Then, try "Amazing Grace." I picked one that gives you the words:

News from Allen Graham, Missionary

Greetings Church of the 49ers family! I trust you are all well as we slowly come out of the shelter-in-place guidelines and move to what is being called "the new normal." One thing remains the same though, there are many people around us who still need to know God and have a personal relationship with His Son, Jesus Christ. Let's keep on telling the Good News to all we can!

Thanks for praying for my plans to return to Ecuador. This was originally scheduled for June 29, which obviously didn't happen. Most government offices in Spain are now open, so let the paperwork begin!

However, another stumbling block has surfaced. I had a suspicious dark brown spot on my back. It was removed on June 5 and I got the biopsy on June 22. I have nodular melanoma. I am scheduled for several other tests and examinations to see if there has been any spread.

I don't know how long the growth had been there before I noticed it one morning when God told me to glance into the mirror while drying off after my shower. Please pray that I can get all the tests done and get the results soon so that I will know what my next steps are. Specifically, pray that there has been no further spread of cancer, if that is God's will.

I'm thankful for the good healthcare that we have available to us in Spain and for the good health insurance provided by Reach Beyond. I'm also thankful for the help and support of our local team here. Most of all, I'm thankful for your prayers.

Regarding the return to Ecuador, a lot will also depend on what kind of treatment I will need for the melanoma and when I can get it. God is in control and

everything will happen in His time, not mine.

Let me close by sharing some exciting news from two of our partners:

A missionary who has a ministry with some of the isolated people in our region has been producing programming in their native language that we broadcast via shortwave. Recently, three young men contacted our partner and became Christians. Many of the people in these remote areas have shortwave radios, but even more of them have cell phones. It is the hope of our partner to use a smartphone app in order to reach even more listeners. The app will clearly convey the message of God's Word. Pray for wisdom for those leading this project and for positive outcomes from the field testing which is going on now.

Praise God for His protection over our partner in southern Lebanon and their refugee ministry. The teacher for the music school with the youth and children says they are now meeting again in small groups for lessons. He says, "The seeming tragedy of the pandemic has instead brought about incredible fruit and greater openness to the gospel! We're so grateful and excited for what God is doing and what's to come in the weeks and months ahead."


What's in a name?

The meeting room in Faith Hall is appropriately named after two of our church benefactors: Charles and Mae Ramont.

And, the Ramonts? Originally they were members of the First Presbyterian Church, Modesto. Later, Charles assisted in purchasing property for a new church, the Geneva Presbyterian Church, also in Modesto, and the Ramonts joined that church in 1953. This Christian couple were devout ecumenicists. Their generous contributions, especially to new Presbyterian churches and Sunday School programs, were appreciated by cash-strapped ministers and congregations. Charles' volunteer work led him to become a mentor to several young pastors.

However, Charles and Mae—both Stanislaus County employees—also loved the mountains and rural folk, especially the children. They had no children of their own. Their weekend visits drew them to the little country church in Columbia, a small sanctuary with a "sagging bell tower." It became their second spiritual home in the 1940s, and thereafter. The Ramonts served faithfully, tithing, teaching and participating in various church groups. The Sunday School teachers appreciated their scripture readings; children looked forward to their sweets; and others always felt comfortable when they saw their glowing smiles.

As we reminisce, recall that the great fire of June 22, 1950 destroyed our historic church sanctuary and the manse. Even before the charred timbers had been removed, Pastor Joseph Hillhouse announced plans for a new sanctuary to emerge from the ashes—

a replica of the original First Presbyterian Church, the "Church of the 49ers."

Donations were sought from people all over the state of California, and about 200 volunteers were gathered to begin the rebuild. Meanwhile, the congregation was forced to worship at the IOOF and Masonic Halls in Columbia.

Fortunately the tiny Youth Center survived the fire; it was a rough-hewn retreat built during the Depression years as a gathering place for church boys and girls and occasionally small groups of adults.

A few months after the fire, a hastily constructed addition to the Youth Center enabled most church activities

to resume on the campus. It was a generous \$5,000 donation, given anonymously by Charles and Mae Ramont, that made this possible. This temporary church was later named "Ramont Hall" in their honor.

Until 1954 when the new sanctuary was completed, Ramont Hall became the 49er Church's manse, sanctuary, business office,

social hall and even a community center. It was a popular meeting place for young and old of the congregation and their friends. Seating approximately 100 with a stage, the hall was used for worship, Bible study, the Dorcas women's group and the Mariners couples' groups, church socials, and for Wednesday movies, weddings and receptions. Vacationing youth groups from the Valley and even the Bay Area who came to experience the spectacular Mother Lode and play in the snow used it for overnight lodging. Also, the College of the Pacific (now UOP) drama students slept and ate in Ramont Hall while performing at nearby Fallon Theatre.

In the midst of these activities, Pastor Hillhouse and his family maintained their household in the building for several years.

Through the years, the Ramonts continued to drive to their adopted "Church of the 49ers" until Mae passed away on April 10, 1955. Charles remained active in the Geneva Presbyterian Church until his health began to fail in the mid 1960s. During his last weeks in 1966, he wrote to Columbia friends that he hoped to "find some automobile going in the direction of Columbia some Sunday morning" which had "room for an extra passenger" so he could worship and visit with his old friends.

Charles H. Ramont died in Modesto on April 22, 1966 at the age of 91.

Friends, our Church of the 49ers has been blessed by benefactors such as Charles and Mae Ramont.


