A Word from the Pastor

"Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this," says the Lord Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that there will not be room enough to store it."

Malachi 3:10 (NIV)

"Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

2 Corinthians 9:6-7 (NIV)

As the calendar turns from September to October, we have come upon a familiar time of year: stewardship season, and our annual Stewardship Campaign. I know that 2020 has certainly been a crazy and unusual year filled with all sorts of ups and downs, chaos, and uncertainty. We had church services shut down for the better part of 3 months, we still aren't able to do many of the activities that have become such an important part of the life of our church such as Monday Night Dinners, singing during worship, shaking hands and giving hugs, listening to the choir perform, etc. And that's just in the life of our church; it's not even considering how our day-to-day lives and activities have been changed!



However, it's precisely because the life of our church has been so drastically altered that the Stewardship Campaign becomes all the more important because the Stewardship Campaign is focused on our giving for 2021 and we are hoping and praying, if God is willing, that 2021 will allow us to fully open back up; and, if that is the case, if we are able to fully open back up next year, we need to be ready to jump back into our missions, ministries, and outreach with both feet. We need to be prepared mentally, spiritually, and financially to hit the ground running in 2021 to be Christ's hands and feet in Tuolumne and Calaveras Counties; and the only way we can be fully prepared is by having the resources to do so, and by being able to budget our funds and how we disburse them to achieve the mission of the church.

That's where the Stewardship Campaign comes into play; it allows us to get an idea of how much money we can be expecting to receive in tithes and offerings in 2021 so that we can make a fiscally responsible budget that allows us to accomplish all of the goals that God

has for us without stretching ourselves too thin and getting the church into a bad situation financially. By having an accurate budget that has been put together based upon actual pledges rather than flying by the seat of our pants based upon how much money is in the offering plate each week, we will be much more equipped and prepared to follow the Great Commission given by Christ Himself to "go and make disciples."

Now, I want to make clear that neither I nor anyone on our Session is trying to force you to make a pledge because, as Paul wrote to the Corinthians, God doesn't want us to give reluctantly or under compulsion, but cheerfully; so, we would never force or compel anyone to do something they don't want to do or are uncomfortable with, especially not with their money.

However, we are fervently asking that you determine how much you are willing to give cheerfully.

And, the good news of the matter is, if we do cheerfully give God what is rightfully His, we have the promise, as we see in the passage from Malachi, that He will bless us beyond measure; He will bless us beyond anything we could imagine.

So, with those two thoughts in mind, I wanted to remind you how our annual Stewardship Campaign works: Within the next couple of weeks, each one of our covenant partners and regular attenders will be receiving a letter directly from me regarding stewardship, with a pledge card included. You will then be given several weeks to prayerfully consider how much money you feel that you will cheerfully be able to give to the Church of the 49ers next year. Then fill out and return the card; which you will be able to mail in, drop off at the office, or place in the offering plate. During these weeks, I will be talking about the Stewardship Campaign each Sunday during the announcements, and I will be asking different elders to give short talks about how your funds are being used to support their ministry area.

As I stated in my article on the Stewardship Campaign last year, I know that talking about money can often be awkward and uncomfortable; and I don't want to make anyone in our church feel that way. So, my goal during this time is to gently stress to everyone the importance of being good stewards and filling out your pledge cards without being overbearing or condemning about it. We had a successful Stewardship Campaign last year without me spending 4-6 weeks preaching sermons specifically about stewardship and tithing, so my hope is that we will be able to replicate that this year. And, just like last year, I want this entire Campaign, this whole process, to be as painless, open, and transparent as possible; so I

want you all to know that my door is always open. You can drop by and visit or give me a call if you have any questions, concerns, or ideas regarding the Campaign. I will also be making certain that the expected operating budget for 2021 is printed in the bulletin, and readily available for all of you to see, so you will know the goal that we are trying to reach through the campaign.

I know deep down in my knower, as my dad used to say, that God has amazing things in store for the Church of the 49ers in 2021; and so my prayer is that each one of our covenant partners will understand why the stewardship campaign is so important. We don't do this because we are greedy and are trying to pressure you into giving us your money; we do it to help our covenant partners and regular attenders fulfill God's command to return a portion of what He has given us, and we do it so that we can faithfully plan the missions and ministries of our church for the next year. So, I pray that each and every one of us will make the effort and take the time to pray, determine how much we can give to the church in 2021, and fill out our pledge card. God loves, and blesses, a cheerful giver; so let's all cheerfully give!

Semble Loan Campaign

The campaign to raise funds for improvements and major repairs to church property is under way. The major issues are: the roof of Faith Hall, the east and west siding and window frames of the Sanctuary, the roof of the Christian Education building (38 years old), the fire suppressant sprinkler heads and ceiling tiles in Faith Hall, and the pavement replacement at the main street entrance leading to the Sanctuary.

The Faith Hall roof is likely the most costly with bids in hand ranging from \$25,000 to \$50,000. The Building and Grounds Committee has diligently considered them all. Along with concurrence of the Finance Committee, Session has approved the recommendation of these two committees of a \$39,450 bid to discover and repair damaged underlayment, and overlay the roof with a 50 year warranted product. The bid includes a new gutter on one side plus adding two

additional down spouts on each side for a total of three down spouts on each side of the building.

The Christian Education Building roof is simply needing replacement due to normal wear and tear before more serious problems occur.

The east and west siding of the Sanctuary has served us since the rebuilding in 1954 and is showing signs of failure.

The final (major) item is the street pavement leading up to the main entrance to the Sanctuary. This is a safety issue. The pavement is loose and uneven which gives easy opportunity for slipping and falling, which in fact has occurred.

The appeal of the "Semble" arrangement or system, is it affords us, the members and friends, the opportunity to loan money to the church and earn

interest at the same time. The investor can choose an interest rate of up to 4%. It also gives anonymity to the participants. This is due to the formation of a third party Limited Liability Company (LLC) managed by Semble for the benefit of Church of the 49ers. The Church is the sole "member" of the LLC and has no knowledge of who is participating—only the total of funds invested are known and received through the LLC. Likewise, when the church makes payments on the loan, the funds are funneled through the LLC back to the investors.

Hello Church of the 49ers family! Greetings this month from Sonora! That's something new, isn't it?

Let me begin by saying **THANK YOU** to all who were able to participate in my mother's 90th birthday celebration on Saturday, September 26. It was a fabulous day and she enjoyed seeing many of you. Thanks also to my *accomplices* who helped me pull off the surprise.

Please be praying for my transition back to Ecuador. I have several documents that I need to take with me to apply for my Ecuadorian missionary visa. I hope to have these done and be able to leave for Guayaquil, Ecuador the end of October, first part of November. In the meantime, I will be doing some mission representation in northern California.

I've mentioned before about *Reach Beyond*'s work at the Moria Refugee Camp in Lesbos, Greece. I have not participated on a team, but many from our mission have served there over the past year. This camp was designed to hold 3,000 people but has had up to 23,000 people in recent months, with more than two-thirds of them being women, children, and unaccompanied minors.

On September 3, the site was locked down after over 30 cases of Covid-19 were found. On September 8, the camp caught fire and burned to the ground. Refugees slept on the sides of the roads, in olive groves and even a graveyard. Some had only a blanket or sheet and others had nothing for protection. In the streets there was no organized way to provide water or food.

Please pray for the men, women and children caught in this awful situation; pray for government authorities to find a solution; and for workers from *Reach Beyond* and other organizations to bring desperately needed food, water, blankets, and medical help.

Please pray for Turkey. Of the 85 million people in the country, it is estimated that there are only 8,000 believers. In a crackdown on Christianity in the last couple of years, the government has deported many missionaries and Christian workers. In 2019, thirty-five Christian workers received deportation orders and sixteen have been expelled this year. These actions appear to be a part of an official campaign and in recent weeks two additional deportation orders were issued.

Please pray for our media partner in Turkey. Because of the pandemic, they have seen a large increase in the number of people contacting the team. While it seems that the Turkish authorities plan to stamp out Christianity in their country, we can see that it is God's plan to reach the Turkish people with the truth of His love and forgiveness. Please pray for our partner, for their team as they continue to broadcast the gospel and follow up with listeners, and for the teams in various cities that have been formed as they interact with the people that are reaching out.

Thank you for sharing in my ministry and walking this incredible journey with me!

Per the CDC, getting a flu vaccine is more important than ever during 2020-2021 to protect yourself and the people around you from flu, and to help reduce the strain on healthcare systems responding to the COVID-19 pandemic. Since it takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body and provide protection against flu, make plans to get vaccinated early in fall, before flu season begins. CDC recommends that people get a flu vaccine by the end of October.

Unfortunately, the popular Tuolumne County Health Fair had to be canceled this year due to the pandemic. If that's where you usually get your flu shot, the Tuolumne County Public Health Department wants you to know they are offering a drive-through opportunity to receive a no-cost flu vaccine this month, while supplies last.

The dates and locations for the 2020 Flu Vaccine Drive-Through are:

Wednesday, October 7, noon to 4:00 pm at the Groveland Library/Youth Center, 18990 Main Street, Groveland Wednesday, October 13, 9:00 am to 3:00 pm at the Sonora Library/Senior Center, 480 Greenley Road, Sonora

Or, flu shots are also available Tuesdays, 8:30 to 11:00 am, at the Tuolumne County Public Health Department, 20111 Cedar Road, Sonora.

Visit https://www.tuolumnecounty.ca.gov/1307/Flu-Vaccination-Clinics to download and print the required Client Registration/Consent Form. We will also have some forms available in Faith Hall on Sundays for you to pick up.

Requirements for the Flu Vaccine Drive-Through:

- Wear a proper face covering.
- Wear loose-fitting clothing, such as a short-sleeve shirt.
- Sit by the window of the vehicle if you are getting a vaccination.
- Parent or legal guardian must accompany children.
- Have your registration form completely filled out <u>before</u> you arrive.
- Please stay home if symptomatic.

Young 49ers

I am pleased to introduce Rev. Francis Edward Clark (1851-1927) to you: he did not know Gold Rush Columbia and was not even a Presbyterian. As one reflects about the memorable 1850s, we know a group of largely Maine Men (Clark's homeland) discovered gold in Columbia in a small gulch at the foot of Kennebec Hill (named after a river in Maine). Shortly thereafter, devout residents organized the First Presbyterian Church in mid December, 1854.

However, that is not where this article should begin. For that we must consider events in the Pine Tree state. During Columbia's early Gold Rush years, Francis Edward Clark was born. He appeared to be alert, healthy, energetic and always curious about his environs. He graduated from Dartmouth College (1875) and became a Congregational Church pastor with concerns about the neglect of training for young Christians in Maine and elsewhere. (We are aware that regular Christian education classes for youngsters was not common in Mother Lode churches in the early days.)

As early as 1881, Pastor Clark proposed a Christian Endeavor organization to reemphasize Jesus' love for children. In 1895, his beliefs became interdenominational, eventually appearing in 29 countries with participants numbering several million— "For Christ and The Church." Clark's initial mission was to assist young people: "help them grow in the faith and be trained for Christ's service." By the late 1800s, the movement had expanded to include adults; at the same time it became widespread in protestant churches throughout the United States.

After a World Christian Endeavor Convention in San Francisco in 1931, Rev. Clark's pastoral epistle was introduced to the youth of Tuolumne County by local

seminary student pastors. Stanley George (1931) established a spiritual foundation for the Christian Endeavor students after organizing a Boy Scout troop at the Church of the 49ers in Columbia. Local boys appreciated youthcentered worship, Sierra hikes and campfires surrounded by church companions and stars overhead. In the early 1930s, a group of youngsters attending the small Standard Presbyterian Church decided to participate with Mr. George and his Christian Endeavor boys. Later student pastor Paul Steps (1934) arrived to provide worship services at the two Presbyterian churches. The student pastors served both struggling congregations and also the youngsters, however their monthly meetings lasted only a few years.

When the Standard Lumber Mill closed, the local congregation merged with the nearby Methodist Church in 1936.

During the depression years the Church of the 49ers sanctuary needed to be rehabilitated; church membership had slowly grown only to 53 in 1931; a campus manse was needed to accommodate the inadequately paid pastors. Rev. Roscoe Nickerson agreed to become pastor of the Church of the 49ers (1935 - 1938) while awaiting his retirement. He was not deterred by the difficulties confronting the small church. During his pastorship, a modest manse was erected.

In addition, Pastor Nickerson was always concerned about his young worshipers. He inspired the church to "start the young people in the right direction." This objective led the congregation to assemble a rough lumber clubhouse for the youngsters, especially the Christian Endeavor worshipers. It was apparent the youngsters felt comfortable in the Sabbath services and social activities at their own "clubhouse sanctuary" on nearby Gold

Street. By the late thirties, their membership had reached 25 participants with twelve to fifteen boys and girls regularly attending meetings at the church and their cozy clubhouse.

The Church of the 49ers is fortunate to have a few recorded oral history interviews with several who were teenagers during those memorable years. To them it was a Golden Age for young Christians. One recalled that it was a time of spiritual and personal togetherness. The church had become the social, recreational and worshiping center for rural Columbia. A senior recalled, "We volunteered for everything in those days," serving with Boy Scouts and Girls Scouts, campus clean-up crews, holiday worship pageants and even became Sunday School helpers. We are reminded after the Great Fire of 1950, young volunteers collected hundreds of square nails from the ashes to be enclosed in national letters to solicit assistance in rebuilding the historic sanctuary. It was a successful allcommunity effort leading to a new sanctuary for the Church of the 49ers in 1954-the 100th anniversary of the church.

In 1951 an exciting trip to Sacramento was arranged to meet with politicians and Gov. Earl Warren; the governor had been an admirer of the historic mining camp. In a letter he sent "wishes for a successful restoration" of the church. (Recall, Earl Warren signed the bill creating Columbia Historic State Park on July 15, 1945.)

The old clubhouse remains an important memory for a few seniors as they recall the Great Depression years. The rough board siding left many entries for rain and wind as it became inclement outside and inside. In the small room, an ancient "box stove" struggled to keep the shelter comfortable. Despite its limitations, it did manage tasty snacks. Young volunteers supplied cookies and prepared hot drinks of evaporated milk, sugar and cocoa.

On holidays attending adults provided special sweets. The youngsters had the

habit during their worship of joining to "have a sing" using their "wonderful song books" of spiritual favorites. A recorded informant remembered it as a time of "friendly, devoted and helpful" people, young and mature, serving in their Mother Lode community church during difficult times.

Sunday School classrooms were originally located in the sanctuary. The back of the room had been partitioned into small rooms for worshipers. Also, other groups assembled in the balcony and even a tiny belfry room. Indeed, there was a place for all: infants, elementary and high school students and visiting friends. During Pastor Hillhouse's leadership (1948-1958), over 100 youngsters were actively involved in the church during week-long activities and holidays. Occasionally, awards of attractive pins were presented to the young worshipers by the pastors for outstanding attendance and service. On special occasions, exciting outings were arranged-Yosemite, Lake Tahoe, valley churches and also picnics.

The fire of 1950 which destroyed the church sanctuary did not even scorch the

Clubhouse. During the ensuing years, the timeworn structure was remodeled and enlarged. It served as the entrance to what was called Ramont Hall-the temporary sanctuary and activities center during the construction of the new Presbyterian church sanctuary. A VIRTUAL TOUR of the structure takes us from the Clubhouse's Gold Street entrance into the hall. On the right, we notice a small restroom. Across the hall is the bedroom for Pastor Joe and Mrs. Virginia Hillhouse. Their "manse" was less than palatial; it was in frequent use by various church committees. No complaints were ever expressed by the couple. Pastor Hillhouse

reminded all that the sanctuary was gone but the CHURCH LIVES ON-and their faith never wavered! The kitchen adjoined their living quarters. Beyond was a large room with a chancel at one end. The sanctuary featured Hollywood movies, potlucks, visiting snow groups, committee meetings and, of course, Sabbath services. Ramont Hall served as Columbia's social center for many years. It was the church's only sanctuary, manse and recreation center from 1951 until 1954 during the construction of the new First Presbyterian Church of Columbia. (Today demolished Ramont Hall is the site of the Christian Education building and portions of Faith Hall.)

Readers, the church youngsters of this CLUBHOUSE CHRONICLE are an important page in the history of the Church of the 49ers. We are reminded of the tireless pastors, youth ministers and volunteers who actively prepared sons, daughters and grandchildren of the church families for the 21st century. Now, neighbors, you are invited to be with us as we continue worshiping—expressing CHRIST AND CHURCH!

See the light.


He writes hope
