

### A Word from the Pastor

"Jesus called them together and said, 'You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be your slave—just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many'" **Matthew 20:25-28 (NIV)** 

"Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins. Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling. Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms." **1 Peter 4:8-10 (NIV)** 

Well, we have reached the month of November; Halloween has come and gone and Christmas is right around the corner. November is the month that people all over our country give thanks for all of the good things that we have in our lives; where we Christians thank God for all of the blessings that He has bestowed on us. As we start to put up our Christmas decorations and make plans to prepare and eat the biggest meal of the year, we also take time to remember and reflect upon the things for which we are thankful. And, as I reflected on this month and the things for



which I am thankful, my mind couldn't help but wander back to our ongoing stewardship campaign.

Now, you might be asking yourself, "Pastor Keith, what does Thanksgiving have to do with stewardship?" And, I'm glad you asked. I think that there are two important ways that the Thanksgiving holiday and the idea of gratitude that it represents are connected to stewardship. First, if we look at the passage above from Matthew, Jesus informs the disciples that whoever wants to be first, whoever wants to be great, must be a servant just as He came not to be served, but to serve. During the Thanksgiving holiday, and really during the Christmas season at large, people tend to focus more on serving others; whether they volunteer at a homeless shelter or food bank to help serve Thanksgiving dinner to those in need or they spend all day in a hot kitchen to cook a big meal for their entire family, most people make an effort to serve others during the holidays.

And what Jesus is saying in the above passage is that serving others is not something that we should be reserving only for the holiday season, it's something that we should be doing everyday

all year long. God calls us to be servants, so we shouldn't be restricting ourselves to fulfilling that command only during the holidays and think that we are doing "enough;" we should constantly look for ways that we can be of service, that we can be a blessing, to others. And this idea of service ties directly into stewardship. Being a good steward, as the Apostle Peter tells us, means that we are utilizing all that God has blessed us with for His glory and for the service of others; this includes our money, our talents, our wisdom, our experience, even our life. Stewardship means, rather than being stingy or hoarding God's gifts, we utilize all of them properly for the advancement of His kingdom. And how do we advance God's kingdom in this world? We do it by being the hands and feet of Jesus and serving others just as He did when He walked this earth. Therefore, we can see that we are being good stewards of God's many blessings if we are utilizing His blessings in the service of others; that other people will experience the love of Christ through our service to them.

And this idea of using all of God's blessings to serve others is one of the main reasons why we undertake a Stewardship Campaign every year. Our church wants to make sure that we are being as

effective as we can possibly be in our missions and our ministries, as effective as we can possibly be in serving others, and the only way that we can do that is if we have an accurate picture of the resources we will have to work with for a given year. It is only through your pledges that we are able to plan a budget and, thus, plan our programs and ministries in order to faithfully fulfill Christ's command to serve others; it allows us to focus on being the hands and feet of Christ in our community without having to constantly worry how we are going to get the money for it and where it's going to come from.

But, there's another way that Thanksgiving is connected to the idea of stewardship. Thanksgiving is a time for us to be thankful for all the good things that we have, for all of the ways that God has blessed us; and what better way to show God that we are thankful for His blessings than by following His command to utilize those blessings to serve others and be good stewards of His grace? I submit to you that there is no better way to show our gratitude than that. So, in whatever way that God has blessed you, show Him how thankful you are by using those blessings to bless others. But, as I said in my article last

month, don't give of your blessings out of compulsion or out of sense of obligation, do it out of love, love for God and love for others; do it joyfully knowing that you are honoring God and showing your gratitude for Him and the way that He has blessed you.

### **Buildings & Grounds - Seeking Volunteers**

A few of us in the church have been spending some time working on the church campus in the last 7 months - in a socially-distanced manner. *Thank you, John Malaspino, Robert Baker, Jeff Goularte, Sharon Poff, Sally Tullar, Gary Davis.* 

Just in case you are getting bored at home, and would like to help us beautify the campus, may I suggest some simple one-man/woman projects where volunteers are desired:

1.) We have two park benches in the front yard which need to be sanded and repainted. They were donated by Pat and Russ Edell when they moved to Texas back in 2014 and have been repainted once already. But they both need some beautification. We're finally headed for a little cooler weather, so now is the time. They can be moved to the Faith Hall porch if desired for a more pleasant place to work.

2.) When we ordered the new pew cushions for the sanctuary, we also received enough of the burgundy

material to reupholster the three chancel chairs so they match the cushions. It appears to be a simple job of taking apart the wooden chairs and stapling on the new material. This could be done inside the sanctuary, or the chairs could possibly be delivered to your home for the project.

3.) We have about 30 more reupholstered pew chairs that need steam cleaning. In July Sharon Poff and I cleaned the 20 used in CE and they look so much better!

4.) A yard work project (which our gardener Jean can't do) is to pull away all the old leaves/dirt from the base of the fence in the back of the sanctuary. The front side of the fence is pretty good now, but to keep the fence from rotting so quickly we need to also clear the back side.

5.) Experienced volunteer painters are welcome too!

### Allen Graham, Missionary

Happy November and greetings once again from Sonora.

As I mentioned last month, I was hoping to return to Ecuador around this time. However, with the pandemic, there are significant delays in getting the required documents that I need to apply for my Ecuadorian missionary visa. *Please keep praying for this*.

When I was in Ecuador before, I lived in Quito, the capital city. This time however I will be in the country's largest city, Guayaquil. I will be working with the small team at Radio HCJB2, an FM station that serves the two southwestern provinces of Ecuador. November 1 is the 48<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the station, so Happy Anniversary HCJB2! I remember the first time I visited the station was for its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 1997. I was so impressed with the excitement and gratitude that was expressed by the listeners and their families when they came to the Open House that day. My task was to blow up balloons for the children. As I write this, a celebration is going on to thank God for His faithfulness to this ministry for the past 48 years.

In early October, the team at HCJB2 heard about Zoila, an elderly woman who can barely see and hear. Zoila's neighbor listens to the station and called to say that she lived in neglect and was running low on food. Because the station has received donations of food items for situations like this, they went to visit Zoila. When they arrived, they found her kneeling next to her bed asking God for someone to come with food for the next day because she had run out. With a big smile that lit up her face, Zoila received the producers and with tears in her eyes, she did not stop glorifying God for having answered her prayer that same night. With emotion and gratitude, she said: "You are the angels that God sent to answer my prayer," while showing her Bible, which, according to her words, she embraces every night before falling asleep. She said: "Keeping the Word of God at your side gives you hope, you know that God's promises are there, they sustain you every day."

In her morning show the next day, one of the producers, Mayra, told the story of Zoila and then challenged the audience with this question: "Do you want to show mercy? Then visit Zoila." The response was impressive, several people went to Zoila's humble room with food and household items and a medical center and dentist offered their services too.

Meanwhile in Quito, we heard the story of eight-year-old Joel, a faithful listener of HCJB. He loves oatmeal and heard our producers talking about it on the radio. However, his parents could not buy it for him because they did not

have money. His father told him that if he really wants to eat oatmeal, he needs to ask God. A few days later, a producer from HCJB arrived with food for members of her church who barely have enough to eat. Joel's family received a basket containing four packets of oatmeal. When Joel opened the box, he exclaimed with amazement and joy: "I asked God for one bag, but He gave me four!"

Praise God for how He hears and answers our prayers, as well as those of listeners like Zoila and Joel. Thank you for allowing me to walk this journey together with you. And although it will be very different this year, Happy Thanksgiving!


