A Word from the Pastor

"The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God—children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God. We have found ourselves once again in the midst of the Christmas season. We have gorged ourselves on turkey and dressing, sweet potatoes and pumpkin pie; and now we turn our attention to presents and trees, eggnog and Santa Claus. The Christmas season oftentimes seems to be a bit of a double-edged sword doesn't it? On the one hand it is a season of hope, joy, love, and anticipation, a season that we get to spend time with loved ones; but, on the other hand, it is a season of stress and busyness as we strive to get all of our shopping done, plan and attend Christmas parties (at least in a non-pandemic year), bake cookies and cakes, and decorate our homes. Many years, it seems, we get so caught up in doing everything we can to celebrate the season, we forget to actually enjoy the season. And, more importantly than that, we forget to take time to think about, and meditate upon, why we celebrate the season in the first place.

There's a fairly common Christmas saying that appears on sweaters, cards, signs, etc. that reads, "Jesus, He's the reason for the season." It's a cute saying and it is most certainly true, but how often do you actually take time during the busy month of December to really consider what that means, that Jesus is the reason for the season? How

often do you consider just what Jesus, and His Father, did for us two millennia ago when He was born in that stable in Bethlehem?

In the first chapter of the Gospel according to John, we read that the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, that God Himself became a man and lived just as we lived, that the One who created the world entered into the world but was rejected by the mankind He created. That's a pretty powerful image. Jesus Christ, the Son of God, in fact God Himself, who had spent all of eternity in the glory and perfection of the heavenly realm, left that place, the place that we are all striving to get to one day, and willingly came to live on this earth filled with sin--anger, hatred, violence, death, and destruction. That's how much God loves us, He essentially sent His Son out of His glorious mansion to live in what amounts to a rundown shack. And Jesus loves us so much, that He came, He condescended Himself to live in the muck and the filth of this sinful broken world.

And why did He do that? Why did God send Him here? He did it, as we are told in John 3:16-17, to save the world so that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life. Those two verses are probably the two most wellknown verses of Scripture in the entire world. There are thousands, if not millions, of non-Christians who could quote those verses to you; but how often have you really meditated upon those words? Let me repeat them for you again; take a moment and really dwell upon these words: "For God so LOVED the world, that He sent His ONE and ONLY Son that WHOEVER believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life. For God DID NOT send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but to SAVE the world through Him."

God loves each and every one of you so much that He doesn't want to see you be condemned to an eternity outside of His presence, He wants you to spend eternity WITH Him. Church Bells

In this modern society it seems one's effectiveness in communicating a serious message is all too often a "lost art." However, speakers try to improve their ability to communicate by reiterating their message in repetitive manner.

Historically, the early Spanish padres in California used pealing bells to announce various scheduled mission events. To improve their message additional bells were added to the bell towers to convey their individual message for interested residents. Later, church bells in the Mother Lode also announced messages to people in distant outposts. This was an improvement of the original gold miners' "hoot and call" communication resounding over hill and dell from camp to camp for all to assemble at the community plaza. The bell announced various public activities: hangings, fires, parades, worship, and even special observances such as President Abraham Lincoln's assassination in 1865.

This Golden Nugget article will feature the belfry of the First Presbyterian Church of Columbia. The local miners, being enriched after the discovery of gold in the early eighteen-fifties, contributed generously from their valuable "dust" to purchase an essential community alarm bell. When it arrived by wagon, after being shipped around Cape Horn, the bell was located on a ground-level platform at the central plaza on Jackson Street in Columbia. Its pealing called residents to assemble for matters of public concern.

During the years the bells in Tuolumne County churches sent warnings and announcements throughout the prospering mining camps. In a previous *Golden Nugget* (January 1997), there is an informative article entitled "The Three Bells." The pastor of the long-gone Columbia

Methodist Church (South) (1852 - 1855) had removed the original plaza alarm bell to its new church location in Sonora; however, its large size kept the bell in storage. In an important Stockton Record article (January 30, 1951), a reporter described in a lengthy and somewhat complicated description an unusual exchange of three church bells. I have selected from the newspaper a concise segment

of his conclusion summarizing the event: "The Sonora Methodist Church, which acquired the Columbia Methodist Church (South) bell around 1920, found it too big for the Sonora church steeple. So it was traded to the city (Sonora) for a smaller alarm bell the city had purchased from another Mother Lode town. Thus, the Sonora church will still have an alarm bell, Sonora will have its old fire bell back, and Columbia will have its old church bell."

To more fully explain the origins of the first bell owned by the First Presbyterian Church of Columbia, following is information gleaned from a written history of our church by Rev. Paul Steps in 1942:

Apparently, our church's original bell weighed 2,000 pounds, was dated 1852, and came from Boston. It was mounted in a framework on the ground in front of our first sanctuary, originally the Methodist Church South building purchased by the Presbyterians in 1855. After using that structure for almost ten years, it was torn down and a new sanctuary, 50 feet long by 38 feet wide, with a 40-foot bell tower, was erected, finished in 1864. The bell was then moved into the belfry, where it remained for 86 years until the fire of June 1950 which reduced the sanctuary and manse to ashes

and the bell to a molten mass. We still have that melted bell, which is brought out for display occasionally.

The January 30, 1951 article in the *Stockton Record* also includes the following to explain the three-way bell trade:

"By a complicated exchange of bells, begun 30 years ago, the Columbia Presbyterian Church, soon to be reconstructed, will get the large bronze church bell which once hung in the long-gone Columbia Methodist Church (South). The bell, Number 1, with a rotary activator, has been the property of the City of Sonora for the past 30 years and has lain in the Sonora dump since World War I.

George Pitts, Sonora photographer, bought the old Independent Hose Company firehouse in Sonora in 1944. The fire bell (Number 2) in a metal frame atop the building will be taken down and given to Sonora (Methodist Church) Sunday morning. In return, Pitts will receive the old church bell (Number 3), which he will give to Columbia Presbyterian Church."

Friends of the Church of the 49ers, at this point it should be worthwhile for us to tour the Columbia church belfry. An actual excursion into the belfry can be a harrowing adventure. After ascending the Narthex stairs, we come to a door. In the past, at its entrance was an electrical switch which when activated automatically engaged the bell clapper sending a prearranged ringing of the call to worship. In recent years, Brian Ramos has been the church's official bell ringer. About six years ago, Brian personally installed a bell pull rope at the door leading into the belfry. He recommends the ringer exert ten powerful rope pulls with short intervening pauses of the pealing. The church members admire the call to assemble announcing the First Presbyterian Church of Columbia has commenced its Sabbath service.

Only a few curious members ask to examine the "massive" bell (about 800 pounds). They must climb the ancient and narrow stairs. Brian cautions them: be careful! The entire upper platform rattles and shakes as the big bell rings. (Some of the old-timers note the mellow sound of the bell was unforgettable.) Before leaving the belfry, pause on the none-too-stable stairway to examine a stained glass window above the Narthex and facing East. This seldom seen masterpiece honors Vada Carpenter, longtime church Sunday School Superintendent, choir member and volunteer with many committees, including the History Committee. Vada's window, "Burning Bush," is illuminated each evening in the belfry - on a timer.

Are you aware of the Church Bell Ringers? Early belfries usually had several bells. The ringer's pulls and pauses allowed the bell clappers to convey important messages musically. Ringers trained and practiced for many years; some even visited various churches to present

performances. Brian Ramos, may you continue to serve the Church of the 49ers as our honored ringer for years to come.

As I conclude this article, I again return to the writer of the Stockton Record's description about the exchange of "Three Historic Bells." After rereading the entire newspaper article too many times, I can only defer to the author's conclusion in which he describes the interesting exchange: "The situation is not complicated to Tuolumne cattlemen who use their livestock trading skills in settling affairs of all types."

So, now you have it. H'mmm! Nevertheless, this informative description of the exchange of the three historic alarm bells did lead to announcing essential church services and a "home" for each valuable bell.



What's a Crèche?

One story says that St. Francis of Assisi (1182–1226) was inspired by a trip to Jesus' birthplace in 1223. Back in Italy, where St. Francis was from, the story of Christ's birth was being told each year during Catholic mass in a language unfamiliar to most people—Latin. St. Francis pondered that, and felt that the humble birth of Jesus Christ was being usurped and overly complicated by the overabundance of the season.

So St. Francis had an idea. He decided to use animals to make the story come to life in a cave outside the town of Greccio, Italy. He made a living nativity scene, otherwise known as a *crèche*, using a donkey and an ox and a manger filled with hay. These animals were used, perhaps, to represent the fulfillment of the prophecy of Isaiah, and the set was developed using the gospel texts from both Matthew and Luke. St. Francis set up the scene in the cave and told the story of Christ's birth in the common dialect as people walked by. According

to tradition, St.
Francis was so overcome in the telling that he couldn't utter the name of Jesus, calling him instead simply the babe of Bethlehem.




After this first showing, living nativity scenes, or crèches, gained a popularity which continues today. They began to include the characters of Mary, Joseph, and the baby Jesus as well as inn keepers, angels, shepherds, and the three kings, or wise men—although the number of wise men sometimes varies. Generally the number is three to reference the gifts presented to the baby Jesus when they followed the star to find the Christ child. Their names were Gaspar, Melchior, and "old" Balthazar, and they gave the gifts of gold, frankincense, and oil of myrrh.

We use nativity scenes in this country in our public spaces, our homes, and churches. Some people collect them and display entire collections in their homes. They collect crèches from other countries, made of any number of materials. The word *crèche* itself, a French word, now means this nativity scene. It can also be used to define a home for foundlings.

Perhaps when we see a crèche this year, we will stop and remember all the Christmases long ago: the one in Italy in 1223 and—most importantly—the first Christmas Eve and the welcoming of our Savior.
