Word from the Pastor

"Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins. Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling. Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. If anyone speaks, they should do so as one who speaks the very words of God. If anyone serves, they should do so with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ. To him be the glory and the power for ever and ever. Amen."

2 Corinthians 9:6-9

This month, we will be diving into a month-long series on giving, a Christian discipline, a Christian responsibility, otherwise known as stewardship. As such, I thought it would be a great way for us to kick off this new series by taking time to remember exactly what "stewardship" is. If you are like most people, you probably associate "stewardship" with "tithing," so you think about money and finances; and, certainly, finances do play an important part of stewardship. However, when you take a holistic view of stewardship, it becomes readily apparent that it entails so much more than just giving money. The Greek word used in the New Testament that has been transliterated as "steward" is "oikonomos." This word means "the manager of a house or household affairs." Basically an "oikonomos" did not own the house which they were charged to oversee. Rather, they were tasked with managing someone else's house,



from cleaning, to managing finances, to overseeing servants.

The guestion then becomes: why does the New Testament compare Christians with these 1st Century stewards? It makes this comparison because we are not our own—everything we have, our church, our home, our money, even our life itself, is on loan from God who has entrusted us to manage these assets for His glory. So, when we talk about "stewardship" from a Biblical perspective, we are not simply talking about finances; nor are we making a direct connection with giving an offering on Sunday morning, though the offering is an important part of stewardship. Rather, what we are talking about is utilizing all that God has blessed you with for His glory and for the good of others; this includes your money, your talents, your wisdom, your experience, your life. Stewardship means, rather than being stingy or hoarding God's gifts, we utilize all of them properly for the advancement of His kingdom.

And this is why it is so important that we take time to talk about stewardship and giving. This church, the wonderful, historic, Church of the 49ers is not our

church, it is God's church. God has given us this church as a place where we can worship Him and become equipped to minister to those in this community who are lost. Since this is God's church, and since God has created and called His church to be a witness and minister to Him, it is our job, as stewards of His church, to make certain that we are managing it in such a way that it accomplishes the mission its rightful Owner and Master has given it. And how do we do that? We do it by giving of all that God has blessed us with. Our church cannot effectively minister to either our covenant partners or to the community around us without the support of people like each one of you.

And that support does include financial support; our church cannot be effective in our ministry to the community without the generous offerings of our covenant partners. In fact, without money in our account, our church would cease to exist entirely. Everything requires money, and that is no less true for the church no matter how unimportant it is in the realm of eternity. And God understands this; in fact, He's so aware of the importance of money in this world that He spends quite a lot of time in His Word instructing us about it. And one of the most important things that He instructs us to do is to give some of our money, some of the money that HE has blessed us with, back to Him and to His church.



But, as I stated above, stewardship is not all about money, money, money. We also cannot be effective in fulfilling the tasks that God has given us, effective in ministering to our community, without your volunteering of your time and talents, without your sharing of your wisdom, experience, and knowledge, and without your prayers, encouragement, and participation.

But, none of this giving should be done begrudgingly or only out of a sense of obligation; it should be done joyfully and with thanksgiving in our hearts knowing that God has promised if we sow generously, we will reap generously. Since God has promised us that, if we generously give of our resources, we will reap the rewards of that generosity. Shouldn't that make us all the more eager and excited to give to Him a portion of anything and everything that we have? I submit to you that it

should. The rewards for giving generously of your gifts and talents are both rewards in the here and now and rewards in eternity with Him.

My hope for the Church of the 49ers, as we look to the future and what God has in store for us, is that we will become an ever-increasing presence in Tuolumne and Calaveras Counties, that our witness and ministry will reach more and more lives so desperately in need of Jesus Christ. That we can, with confidence, say that we are doing everything in our power to minister to the lost, make disciples, shepherd believers, and be a force for good and a witness to Jesus Christ in all that we do. I truly believe with all of my heart that we have the right people to accomplish this; we have caring, loving people who truly desire to see the lost of our community come to know Jesus as their Lord and Savior; and it is my job, and the job of our Session, to ensure that all of us are fully utilizing the gifts that God has given us to accomplish it. That, in a nutshell, is why it is so important that we take this upcoming sermon series on giving with the utmost seriousness; it is so that we can make certain that God's church in Columbia, CA, the church that He has entrusted to us to be good stewards of, is accomplishing His mission in this community and in the world.

Hello Church of the 49ers family! Thanks for your prayers this past month.

I especially thank you for praying for the control exams for the melanoma. As I mentioned last month, I was waiting on the results of a lymphadenectomy done on June 21. One of the lymph nodes came back positive and was sent to the U.S. for a more detailed analysis. That result should come back by August 8. During July, I have had an MRI of the brain and a PET scan to see if cancer has spread elsewhere in the body. Praise God both procedures came back clean. I will start immunotherapy in the next couple of weeks, which my doctors are saying should be all I need right now. There was consideration given to having radiation therapy also, but after the clean results of the MRI and PET scan, they don't think that will be necessary for now. As I said last month, I'm thankful that God is in control no matter what and I will continue to wait patiently on Him.

Donations to both stations, Guayaquil and Quito, are running significantly below budget. We believe this is mostly due to the uncertainty in the country after the 10-day national shutdown in June. Ecuador's economy has taken a hit, and folks are leery. Our station here in Guayaquil is doing a special sharathon at the beginning of August to remind our listeners of their monthly pledges and we are praying to pick up some new donors also. Will you please pray for God's provision through the audiences at both stations?

On the same note, please continue to pray that the specifics of the agreement, which was made to bring an end to the strike, will be fulfilled. Both sides have been meeting these past weeks to hammer out the details so that future protests can be avoided.



Mid-July I was able to take my two oldest *grandsons* to Ecuador's Amazon region. This was their first time to the jungle. We had so much fun!

In August, let's pray for open doors in Ecuador and in the Mother Lode to share Jesus with the people around us. Let's make His name known!

Locally we have helped Interfaith, Vets Helping Vets, Nancy's Hope, and Columbia Elementary, just to name a few. We encourage members of the congregation to

share organizations they know which could benefit from our help. Our meetings are usually on the third Tuesday of the month at 2:00 pm.

BOOK REVIEW

Not My First Rodeo: Lessons from the Heartland


The two most significant things in Kristi Noem's life that prepared her for serving as governor of South Dakota, as listed in her memoir, "Not My First Rodeo: Lessons from the Heartland," is 1) growing up on a working farm, and 2) spending a year as South Dakota's Snow Queen.

The Snow Queen competition was a scholarship program for high school girls based on character, hard work, personal responsibility and how well she represented South Dakota values. She won--spent a year promoting South Dakota and its people, industry, history, and values, and spoke and gave interviews at different events across the state. (p. 225) All skills she uses as governor.

As Governor looking back, she realized that young girls "must decide you're going to be a teachable person. This means you must be comfortable being uncomfortable, willing to try something new." (p. 226)

Kristi encourages young women to compete in sports as she did growing up, because it teaches confidence, skill building, self discipline and team spirit. Noem championed girls riding events, which the U. S. Department of Agriculture tried to eliminate in 2018, in 4-H rodeos in South Dakota. Rodeos were a big part of South Dakota's culture.

Born in Watertown, her social life eevolved around community events, school, and church at the Family Worship Center. Besides cattle, the family ranching business also included raising corn,



soybeans, wheat, and alfalfa, and sometimes flax and barley. She loved cats (there were about 30) and her dog Hazel, and she also raised an assortment of animals including buffalo, 4-H sheep, and some goats and horses. Says Kristi,

"Farming, hunting, and riding horses was pretty much in our blood," like a lot of Midwestern families. (p. 18)

At the age of 23, Kristi was two months from having her first child, and taking classes at South Dakota State University, when her father died in a tragic farming accident. Her sense of loss was acute, especially when she realized she didn't know how to manage over 1,000 acres of ranching and farmland. All her prayers focused on, Lord if I could only hear his voice, if he could tell me the answers to my many questions, if he could only tell me what to do next. Then she found the microcassette tapes that her father had been recording the day-to-day decisions he made while running the farm. That answer to prayer changed her life.

Her father taught her to work hard, walk fast---run!---, do a job quickly and well, anticipate needs, and be a problem solver. An example of this happened when her dad, in order to stop 'burning daylight,' had extra grain carts during harvest so that they didn't have to stop to collect the overflow.

At thirteen years old, she found herself "driving a four-wheel-drive tractor and grain cart in a field with five combines going at full speed. . . I would pull up within inches of them without stopping and let them empty into my cart before heading full speed to the next combine that was waiting." (pp. 31-32) Two years later she was driving an 18-wheeler. (p. 61) She knew after that she could drive anything.

As to governing values, Noem believes in respecting people, the animals and the process. "Respecting them meant caring about them in a way that acknowledged their dignity and unique characteristics as well..." (p. 35) Her principles for a pandemic, "Stay transparent. Know government's true limits. Trust the people."

Kristi's last learning tip, "[Y]ou can either burn energy being angry at it, or you can focus on accomplishing what you set out to achieve for the people counting on you. Learn the business. Build the relationships. Outwork everybody else around you. And give the rest to God." (p. 230)

A fascinating read!

History of Oral Interviews

Friends:

In this Golden Nugget article, I have included information from several Oral History scholars and some personal experiences as an interviewer. At long last, we now realize that oral communication has become an indispensable historical message which has been neglected in presentations in the Church of the 49ers' historiography. Certainly valuable information from those who have been aware of historic events must be included in church publications. Historians are convinced that LOCAL HISTORY is an important feature of our country's annals. For various reasons many influential residents were unable to provide vital information for the public records. However, we usually reminisce about common citizens in uncommon enterprises at a remarkable time in California when gold assumed precedence in the El Dorado stories. I believe our church members now realize the GOLD WE MINE has come from "Old Timers" in recorded interviews—exciting stories about "how it used to be in the 'days of old, days of gold, days of forty-nine."

Writers have been aware that FEELINGS are essential even if they are not fully apparent when integrated with FACTS in manuscripts. The recording of residents is a revelation about a community—its law and order and gospel and harmony attitudes during the frontier days. Historians, as they conduct their research, do unveil the background events disclosing the personal aspirations and livelihood of the Mother Lode pioneers. It is evident that only after extensive research can scholars hope to understand ancestors far removed from the present generation. Nevertheless, "No person can be isolated from the PAST"We are not "self-contained individuals." A folklorist

remarked that our heritage is "an encouraging remembrance of generative souls"...of saints and sinners who lived to teach and preach about Old Tuolumne with messages providing a little more illumination of our heritage. The chroniclers of the Westward Movement observed, "When an old person dies, a library burns to the ground" (African proverb and our church legacy).

Researchers have discovered long before written records that our ancestors sought to preserve the culture of those who lived during bygone times: with storytellers, prophets, apostles and also poets and balladeers.

Some in our church are unaware that in Faith Hall, members have preserved more than fifty local history records: sermons, elder interviews, community lectures, 35mm slide programs and a few videos. Evidence of these resources clearly indicate His Church, the First Presbyterian Church of Columbia, has been spiritually active and respected as a result of the farsightedness of church pastors and members.



However, skeptics, *Doubting Thomases*, persist: "Why Oral History?" I have reflected about such an inquiry for about sixty

years. As I recall, during my early college education in the 1950s, in a family interview we used a cumbersome reel-to-reel recorder with an unwieldy recording tape stretched between spindles. By 2020 in an interview with Rev. Janet Russell, we had a "shoebox size" recorder using a compact high clarity cassette recording tape. However, the initial question requires an answer. At my retirement desk after speculating, my original thoughts became an everincreasing treatise of reasons to pursue

the church's oral history interviews. After considerable revisions, an abbreviated response emerged: "It is not for the dubious to question the importance of a primary source tape-recorded interview." The professionals declare, THERE ARE IN-NUMERABLE REASONS FOR ORAL HISTORY. Nevertheless, it requires concerned researchers to secure from the individual their valuable subjective messages, their feelings and their recorded verbal heritage. Additionally, experienced interviewers remind us that what may seem to be trivia to some might be vital for a research historian. Parenthetically, when I listen to recorded interviews, I usually am pleased to note how many exceed my uppermost expecta-
