Word from the Pastor

"At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, 'Who, then, is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?' He called a little child to him, and placed the child among them. And he said: 'Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Therefore, whoever takes the lowly position of this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. And whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me.'" Matthew 18:1-5

One of the things that I'm sure many of you have noticed is that our church is making a concerted effort to reach young families and children. Karla, as our Director of Children's Ministries, has done an excellent job of preparing lesson plans for the kids on Sunday mornings; she plans, organizes, and advertises our monthly Family Movie Night to reach families in the community, she even has plans to hopefully start a youth group in the not too distant future. And Karla is supported and assisted in these activities by our Christian Education Elder, Suzanne Williamson, and countless volunteers. It is so exciting to see all of the growth that our church is experiencing in this area and shows that we are dedicated to engaging the youngest members of our community with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

And, as we have been working so diligently to connect with the kids in our community, I can't help but be drawn



to this passage from Matthew where Jesus tells His disciples that they must be like little children in order to enter the kingdom of heaven. But, what does that mean? What is Jesus telling us that we need to do? He means that we are to be like little children in their humility and their lack of concern for their social status. You see, in the culture into which Jesus is teaching, children are seen more as property than they are as valuable members of society; they will grow to be that one day, sure, but they are not there yet. Children in Jewish society were of no importance, subject completely and totally to the authority of their elders. Jesus knew then, and He knows now, that it is not in our nature to humble ourselves and take a low place among our peers; we will not easily take an inferior position.

But, Jesus calls us to take such a position nonetheless because He Himself took such a position. When He held up the little child in this passage as an example, He did so in response to the disciples' question about who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Well, we all know the answer to that question is Jesus Himself: He is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Yet, when He came to this earth, He did so as a lowly carpenter, someone extremely low on the social ladder, and His ministry was defined by the way that He served others. He wasn't

concerned about His own status or how other people perceived Him, He only cared about getting to the work of advancing His Father's kingdom on earth.

As summertime really gets rolling in earnest, as we all enjoy ourselves during these months, whether that be traveling, visiting friends/family, or just spending lazy days around the house, let's all do our best to remember that Jesus calls us to be humble like children, to lower ourselves to a position of humility, graciousness, and servitude. It too often seems in the 21st century that we are defined by how much we accomplish, how much we stand out from the crowd; we are defined by promotions we receive at work, the amount of money we make, the cars that we drive, the size of the house we live in, etc. We are very rarely defined by what we do for others and how we serve the people of our communities.

My prayer for the Church of the 49ers as we continue on this path of striving to reach the youngest members of our community, is that we will also strive to be like little children ourselves. That we will be defined by the fact that we are people who care about and serve our community, not for our own sake, not so we will receive praise and accolades, but for the sake of Jesus Christ and spreading the Good News of His Gospel.



What is ECO?

Have you heard of ECO? Did you know that our church is connected to it, and that Pastor Keith has been participating in a leading role, but don't have a clue what ECO is about? I had a chance to talk to Pastor Keith about our denomination to hopefully clear up any confusion that you may have. Here's what he had to say.

"ECO isn't an exact acronym for our denominational name, which is 'A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians," said Pastor Keith. "ECO is a reworking of the letters of our denominational name to show the idea that we believe our denomination to be like an ecosystem; it is a living, breathing and active community of churches," he continued.

Pastor first came into the ECO denomination as a covenant partner at Eastminster Presbyterian Church in Marietta, Georgia in 2015. He was officially ordained as an ECO pastor by the Presbytery of Northern California and Nevada in October 2019 here at the Church of the 49ers, which meant he could pastor any ECO church.

ECO has geographical divisions around the country, known as presbyteries.

The Church of the 49ers is a member of the Presbytery of Northern California and Nevada, along with other ECO churches in this region.

The churches in the presbytery of Northern CA and NV come together twice a year sometime around April and October. Pastor Keith has not only participated in these events, but has also performed a leading role as Vice Moderator (2 years) and then Moderator (2 years). He is presently in his first year as Moderator.

The purpose of these meetings is to encourage one another, support one another, and to share best practices through training and sharing alternate ways to grow the body of Christ. They also examine new pastors coming into ministry as ECO pastors, and conduct business as needed.

In most Presbyterian denominations, the denominational office is at the top of the organizational structure with the local church at the bottom. However, ECO understands that the local church is where the actual "boots-on-theground" ministry takes place, so the presbyteries and the denominational office actually function to support local churches ministering in their individual contexts.



As such, the structure of our denomination looks more like this:

- Christ is the head of the Church of the 49ers as it ministers to our local community
- Presbytery of Northern CA and NV supports and assists the Church of the 49ers and other churches in the presbytery in fulfilling their mission.
- ECO supports and assists all of the presbyteries and individual churches to ensure that ECO churches across the country are flourishing.

"Ministry happens on a local level," said Pastor. "The denominational office and the presbyteries exist to support the church as it serves at the local level in our ministry to the community."

We thank Pastor Lee for his contributions to our committee. He established a meaningful connection with Adult and Teen Challenge which presented a special service here in January 2023.



As we write our last article for the *Golden Nugget* as co-chairs of the Missions Committee, we want to thank our church for allowing us to help direct the mission efforts of the church. Most of all, certainly, we thank God for providing His love and guidance toward the efforts our committee has made in spreading the Gospel. He has been with us every step along the way. Thank you, also, to our great committee members who faithfully supported us through the last few years. We couldn't ask for a better group of brothers and sisters in Christ.

We recently received a note from Patty Burchell, General Manager of KICY, a Christian radio station in Nome, Alaska, thanking the church for the donation we made to KICY. And Mission Aviation Fellowship also sent a written *thank you* for our church's support of MAF.

Dear Church of the 49ers family, thanks for the opportunity to share another update from the field. I have some exciting news for you!

TRASH TO TREASURE – HUGE PRAISE: In 2019 and 2020, when I was still based in Spain, I asked you to pray for the Trash to Treasure recycling project that was born when Bill Cheung, one of my colleagues, returned from a refugee camp in the Middle East and saw the tens of thousands of empty bottles that filled the camp and the ravines. We were able to get the funding needed to take this task on.

Bill and his wife, Emily, are civil engineers. They started a pilot program in Spain with the purpose of constructing and using a recycling machine to understand its function and to determine realistic end products. They also needed to find a way to alter the machine to make it more "low tech" so that it could be used in remote areas where there may be no reliable electricity. This project gives the people where it is used the ability to clear out the debris that clutters the area and turn it into usable commodities such as cups, plates, building materials, toys, and more.

Bill and Emily have simultaneously worked on the procedure manual that

also includes a teaching plan that relates "Trash to Treasure" to our spiritual redemption and becoming a new creature in Christ. The focus is to use the project as an evangelistic tool.

We are praising the Lord that in mid-May the project took a major step forward when visitors came to Spain to learn how to put together and operate the T2T system. These visitors live in an area of Athens, Greece with the Roma people and will be using T2T as an outreach there. Please pray as we enter this new phase of the project to minister to the Roma people and ultimately to multiply the system to other areas of the world that need to hear the Gospel through this unique ministry. The visitors are excited about using this method to not only make a difference with plastic waste in their community but also as a way of engaging men and women in the local ministry.

Back in Ecuador, God led me to an experienced engineer to tackle the problem of our electrical generator at the transmitter site. He believes that our current generator can be repaired, saving us from the expense of buying a new one. Those repairs are now underway, and reinstallation should be done by the end of the month. Please pray

BOOK REVIEW

"The Watchmaker's Daughter" The True Story of World War II Heroine Corrie ten Boom

If you've read Corrie ten Boom's autobiographical book, "The Hiding Place," you would have the core of the story of Larry Loftis' "The Watchmaker's Daughter." Then Loftis adds his research into the rich trove of diaries, letters, photos and memorabilia, archives, files and books, including the parallel stories of Anne Frank and Audrey Hepburn. Corrie ten Boom's papers are located at the Buswell Library Archives and Special Collections, located in the Billy Graham Center at Wheaton College.

"The Watchmaker's Daughter" is a fast paced read that includes black and white photos of the friends and relatives of the ten Boom family. He also adds near the beginning a helpful list of ten Boom family, refugees, Dutch Resistance and others stating nicknames and relationships to which I often referred back in order to keep everyone straight in my mind.

The ten Booms were Christians who helped anyone in need. This led Corrie's father and family to have an engineer build a hiding place behind her bedroom wall on the top floor of the Beje, their home in the Netherlands. It was built so well that those who hid there were never found by the Gestapo, and eventually escaped, except for one who was scooped up when she walked down a street in the open.

Corrie began hiding people until they could be secreted out of the country;

and she was part of the Dutch Resistance. The Beje was a refuge for Jews, Dutch young people in danger of being snatched as slave labor for German farms and factories, and others running from the Germans. They were free to move around in the Beje, celebrate birthdays, have religious services, read scriptures, and pray together. They could sleep in their own rooms. But Corrie drilled them daily to get into the hiding place within a minute-and-a-half.

Someone came to the door asking for \$600.00, an odd request. Corrie got the money, but also put the Beje occupants on alert. When the Gestapo came, her family was rounded up and held in the local prison. The last time she saw her father, she sat with him waiting for the police to decide their fate. He began reading from Psalm 91 and the whole room grew quiet to listen.

A policeman, seeing that Opa was thin and frail with age, told him to go home. But he replied, "If I go home today, tomorrow I will open my door again to any man in need who knocks." The Gestapo agent told him to get back in line. Nine days later he died.

Corrie managed to connect with her sister, Betsie, before being moved from their first prison, and was sent to the notorious Ravensbrück women's concentration camp in Germany where she and her sister began a camp ministry of encouragement and help to women. The overcrowded bunk house designed for 127 women now held over 700! Corrie began teaching from her Bible which she sneaked past the guards---God made her "invisible" to them. One Sunday she preached nine sermons.

I won't describe the horrific conditions at Ravensbrück, but I'd like to tell a couple of stories. I met Corrie at a Christian Women's Fellowship gathering in Marin County in the late 1970s. The book mentions her visit to San

Quentin Prison, which was near where CWF met. She told of her difficulty in forgiving the men who betrayed and imprisoned her family, and were responsible for the deaths of Betsie and Opa.

She also told the story, not included in the book, of being asked by General MacArthur to minister to the Japanese generals who faced execution after the war. She told them of Jesus'

forgiveness and brought many of them to the Lord during that time.

When I talked with her afterward, I told her how I was "Corrie ten Boom" in the 1976 Bi-Centennial Fourth of July pageant put on by our church, and how I talked about her love for her father. Corrie looked me up and down for a moment, then nodded her head, and said, "You'll do."

I love this book, and I couldn't put it down until I finished it early in the morning.

Coda:

God doesn't make mistakes. Corrie's sister, Betsie, realized that God put them at Ravensbrück so they could win these women to Jesus. After Betsie died, Corrie developed edema, and even though she received a "release" paper, she couldn't use it until her edema cleared up. During that time she kept witnessing to those around her and realized that God had a reason for delaying her exit.

Corrie was over 50, and the rumor ran that everyone over 50 would be executed soon. Time was running out. It turned out that her release paper was a clerical error. The day after the bus dropped her off at the train station, everyone over 50 passed.

Last night I saw a documentary on "Felix Kerston: The Devil's Doctor."

Near the beginning of WW II, Heinrich Himmler had severe stomach pain and he chose Felix Kerston as his doctor who was trained in all kinds of relaxation techniques to relieve pain.

Because of Dr. Kerston's closeness with Himmler, he was besieged by people to help family members get out of the clutches of the Gestapo. His ploy was to get Himmler relaxed, and then say, "Instead of payment could you release this person. It would give you such relief." So Himmler did, over and over again, until he would release the internments of thousands. By the end of the war, Felix asked for three thousand prisoners from Ravensbrück and other camps, and Himmler said, "Why not seven thousand?" And signed off on it. Among those released was Corrie ten Boom.
