# Words from the Pastor

"At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, 'Who, then, is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?' He called a little child to him, and placed the child among them. And he said: 'Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Therefore, whoever takes the lowly position of this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. And whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me.'"

#### Matthew 18:1-5

As a parent with school-age children in the house, August is always a significant month on my family's calendar. August, to me, marks the end of summer because vacations are mostly over or are ending, everybody's heading back to work, school's getting back into session, lunches must be packed, homework must be done; it is a month that signals that the "freeness" of summer is over and we are back to our daily routine. But, more than that, looking at my daughters, Hailey and Ella, and all that they are doing as they start a new year of school reminds me of what it was like when I was a child and attending school. I remember the first few weeks of every year and how excited I was to meet my new teachers, see my friends again, and just generally be back in a routine that I was comfortable with.

And, as I am reflecting upon my childhood memories, I can't help but be drawn to this passage from Matthew where Jesus tells His disciples that they must be like little children in order to



enter the kingdom of heaven. But, what does that mean? What is Jesus telling us that we need to do? He means that we are to be like little children in their humility and their lack of concern for their social status. You see, in the culture into which Jesus is teaching, children are seen more as property than they are as valuable members of society; they will go to be that one day, sure, but they are not there yet. Children in Jewish society were of no importance, subject completely and totally to the authority of their elders. Jesus knew then, and he knows now, that it is not in our nature to humble ourselves and take a low place among our peers; we will not easily take an inferior position.

But, Jesus calls us to take such a position nonetheless because He Himself took such a position. When He held up the little child in this passage as an example, He did so in response to the disciples' question about who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Well, we all know the answer to that question is Jesus Himself, He is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven; yet, when He came to this earth, He did so as a lowly carpenter, and His ministry was defined by the way that He served others. He wasn't concerned about His own status or how other people perceived Him, He only cared about getting to the work of advancing His Father's kingdom on earth.

As summer winds to a close, and we all get back to the daily routines of life, whether we are in school, working, or retired, let's all do our best to remember that Jesus calls us to be humble like children, to lower ourselves to a position of humility, graciousness, and servitude. It too often seems in the 21st century that we are defined by how much we accomplish, how much we stand out from the crowd; we are defined by promotions we receive at work, the amount of money we make, the cars that we drive, the size of the house we live in, etc. We are very rarely defined by what we do for others and how we serve the people of our communities.

My prayer for the Church of the 49ers as we head into the fall is that we will all be like little children. That we will be defined by the fact that we are people who care about and serve our community, not for our own sake but for the sake of Jesus Christ. Let us remember in all that we do, we are to be humble and gracious because our Savior was humble and gracious when He walked this earth. Let us not get caught up in the "rat-race" of life, but focus on how we can better serve others and how God can use our servitude as an instrument to lead people into a saving relationship with Him through Jesus. We can have no higher calling than the calling to be lowly.

May the blessings of the Father and the peace of the Son be with you,



For the next several weeks, the older children in CE2 will be working on memorizing the books of the Bible along with their regularly scheduled lesson plan.


The younger children in CE1 will continue their Bible stories crafts and activities.

### **BOOK REVIEW**

# Israel, My Beloved

# A historical novel by Kay Arthur


Kay Arthur's book, "Israel, My Beloved," has a two-tier time-line. The first level is the story of Sarah, who leaves her husband [the Lord] like Gomer leaves Hosea in his biblical allegory depicting Israel's leaving the Lord God who loved her, while the second time zone runs through the entire history of Israel, as Sara lives it.

This novel's time-line is based on the scripture verse, 2 Peter 3:8, "But do not forget this one thing, dear friends: With the Lord a day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like a day. The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance." NIV

Sarah wants the excitement of following her own desires that take her away from her beloved husband, who has engraved her on his right hand, a covenant mark to reassure her of his unconditional love, that he will never forget her nor forsake her as he watched her leaving him from the upstairs window of their home.

Among her early adventures she has many "lovers" and has born three children. The rest of the story outlines her saga of finding her children knowing the first one with blue-green eyes like hers had died. The terrible guilt of that story is told during the era of Rachael's weeping in Bethlehem over Herod's slaughter of the innocents.

She suffers the destruction of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar, the captivity



of the Israelites in Babylon, where she meets Daniel, the fall of Babylon where she learns of future kingdoms who will rule over Israel, and a timeline of the future coming of the Messiah. She returns with Nehemiah to help rebuild the walls of Jerusalem and the temple, and learns that her husband had left the Temple before the Babylonian attack, and will not return for a very long time.

#### [Spoiler Alert!]

One of my favorite stories is how the Israelite villages escaped the scorched earth attacks of the Cossacks in the Ukraine area of Russia. Remember the hiding place of Saddam Hussein during the Iraq war? It was called a "spider's nest," an underground hidey hole with a few essentials so that someone could stay hidden until the attackers left. So Sarah buried herself with her family and friends in a barn until the Cossacks left.

Sarah goes through the Holocaust during World War II, still looking for her son, whom she had heard was in Holland. She is discovered in a "hiding place" and sent to Auschwitz.

The story of "Israel, My Beloved" is one of keeping family together along with their faith in God, during times of hiding, escape and longing to return to a homeland, which accelerated after World War II, and into the frequent wars against their neighbors after becoming a nation. By then Sarah has found her children, but is still not reunited with her husband.

Then Kay Arthur takes Sarah into the future dealing with the "Anti-Christ" who fulfills scriptures Sarah has read from the book of Daniel. Her distrust of Anthony makes her wary of falling into his traps.

Sarah's story is Israel's story. It is a story of the unfailing love of God for his people, and his perfect timing that brings Israel back to nationhood. Also it is a story of God bringing his people back to himself.

"Israel, My Beloved" is a fast, un-put-down-able read, but its 400-page length means you need to read over several days. If you aren't up on your biblical and historical knowledge, Sarah's story will get you there. I love Kay Arthur's cultural adaptation of the stories as historical facts and the changes she adds to keep the story fresh.

Kay Arthur's "Israel, My Beloved" is a great story for long lazy summer days, and can be found in our church library. Ask Michelle Kidwell, our church librarian, if you need help.

# Allen Graham, Missionary

Hello Church of the 49ers family! Greetings from Guayaquil, Ecuador.

Thank you for praying for our search for a new home for the station. We began in 2015 but have been more intentional these past few years because of the rising crime in the area where we are now. As I told you a few months ago, we thought we had found a place, but a major thunderstorm brought a lot of flooding to the area, so we knew that is not where we wanted to be. In mid-July we visited a home that meets all our requirements and will even give us room for future growth. Praise God that we have been able to agree on a price with the owner and have commitments from two Ecuadorian foundations to provide the financing! We are thankful for God's perfect timing.

Last week we received a voice message from a listener who is a private taxi driver. She said a well-dressed man got in while she was listening to HCJB2 on the radio. The man asked if she was listening to a Christian station, and she said yes. He then asked her if she was a Christian, and again she said yes. He then told her to pull over and let him out. She said, "but weren't you going to ...", and he said, "Yes, don't worry, just

let me off here. I'll pay the fare." She stopped to let him out and he said, "I came out to rob a car because I wanted to do some work, but I don't mess with Christians. You haven't seen me, you don't know me, go on your way." She told him, "God has something planned for you. The purpose and plans of God are perfect. Don't do what you are planning to do. Just tell the Lord that you want to change." He replied, "That's okay, fine," and then quickly got out of the car. We are thankful for God's protective hand over our listener and for her courage to speak up. Please ask God to truly change the heart of the man who planned on robbing her car.

Please continue to pray for the remaining funds to buy the new console for our station. We have commitments for 92% of the cost for the purchase, shipment to Ecuador and installation. We are so close!

On July 15, our entire team drove about an hour east of Guayaquil to the town of Milagro where we did a remote broadcast and welcomed listeners to drop by. We had almost a hundred friends come out to meet us and receive a gift. It was a special time for all

Finally, please be praying for the special elections for president and assembly members on August 20. Because of a government stalemate, the current president closed congress several months ago, forcing early elections. Pray for Ecuadorian voters to make a wise decision. # **Minister Adrian Wise**

Friends of the church, come back with me to the historic nineties, the 1990s at Columbia's Church of the 40ers. Recall that Pastor James McCluskey was interested in enhancing the Sabbath services through God's message to His growing congregation of worshipers. The pastor's desire was to refine the church music program—including the hymn selection and instrumental accompaniment. Pastor Jim had recently met Adrian Wise, a recent music major graduate of Stanislaus State College.

Adrian was hired by the church as the Minister of Music and Minister of Education. Eventually, he served with distinction from 1990 until 2002, twelve memorable years. His responsibility was to improve the 49er Church's popular and traditional music worship for adults and children. Adrian, wife Faye, and sons Zachariah and Gabriel were soon Sonora residents and participants in church and community activities.

During most Sabbaths, I recall hearing Adrian's dynamic bass voice resonating from the chancel into the balcony. His favorite word seemed to be "AWEsome!" From time to time, he delivered sermons; his messages were always "free from the heart" revealing his profound faith and commitment to serve in

His name. However, Adrian's most memorable preaching was usually with small groups and choir members. In time, this young minister emerged as the church Renaissance Man.

As a church Music Man, Adrian Wise dutifully pursued the Presbyterian tradition of worship in his selection of

hymns and their arrangement as well as including the bygone music directors. He directed, composed, played various instruments and occasionally became the choir's soloist. Adrian felt a need to introduce the Hand Bell Choir in worship services. Some church elders reminiscence about the church's "full house" community concerts which included some of Adrian's spiritual arrangements. (He always considered himself to be a "composer at heart.") Adrian directed performances of the youngsters occasionally featuring chancel pageants of the reenactment of historic Biblical scenes. (Many a proud parent was there to applaud enthusiastically.)

During his years as a Minister of Education, Adrian's two sons attended the nearby school in Columbia. Adrian had been elected as a member of the school's Board of Trustees. He became aware that some of the local students had working parents. He had the church initiate the Dynamite Wednesday meetings; the Columbia students gathered in Ramont Hall for fun and fellowship. Church volunteers with

"loving hands" provided hot food, games, Bible lessons and other activities for as many as 75 "latch key kids" while they waited for their parents. A few church members still recall the

church van—a second hand but reliable omnibus with minister Adrian at the wheel and usually enroute with raucous youngsters. It transported many anxious young Christians on another AD-VENTURE. Parents with some trepidation describe a backpacking excursion into the remote Sierra. Adrian led the excited group along pristine alpine lakes and majestic forests to their campsite. We heard that during the evening campfire festivities, a rambling bear emerged to inspect the strangers; however, eventually a more interesting scent led the hungry bruin in another direction. (The wide-eyed campers related an "almost encounter" to their friends and family.)

In the meantime, during the 1960s, the San Joaquin Presbytery sought a rural location for a conference center to accommodate area parishioners in worship where they could enjoy the beautiful Sierra environment. After the ministers examined an area near Oakhurst, a site was purchased.

The 350-acre mountain ranch eventually became the Calvin Crest Conference Center for the Presbyterian Church. The Reverends Joseph Hillhouse and George Crichton of the Church of the 49ers became "key figures" during the developmental years of the Christian camp. Soon thereafter, Adrian Wise became one of the popular counselors helping to provide a unique Christian experience for the campers. Several described outings to nearby Yosemite National Park, hikes in the spectacular mountains, water sports at the swimming pool, wholesome food, Bible study and for one and ALL, a lingering memory of unforgettable people, places and events.

Adrian became a participant in many musical performances in Old Tuolumne; he was a soloist, choir director and member of the Columbia College Choir. It was a time of "good news through music" to local receptive audiences.

In a recorded interview (May 24, 2002), I asked Adrian, "When you reflect about your twelve years at the historic Church of the 49ers, what do you consider your most satisfying service in His name?" He responded that it was satisfying to assist people in worship, to meet with God through music, prayers and sermons, and also "I could be a part of those activities." Additionally, he reflected, "When God invites us into His World while serving Him we will see that He gives us the blessing as a participant..." He went on, "I am learning to listen for His voice because when I am quiet, I hear Him." We are justified through faith to have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. We rejoice because we have confidence in the Lord God in the future.

One of my admired Biblical scholars was Dr. William Barclay. In his study of the Gospel of John he wrote, "Jesus was quite certain that the future was in the hands of God and not of men....and nothing, in the end, can frustrate the will of God."
