Dear Church of the 49ers
Friends and Family,

This month, I want to do something a little different with my article for the Nugget and take this opportunity to tell you about the new ministry structure that Session approved at our last meeting. Previously, both Session and I felt like we had too many committees that were stretched too thin. So, we wanted to come up with a way to streamline our operations a bit and make things a little more sustainable. The decision that was made, then, was to reorganize our committees in order to reduce the total number of committees and, in doing so, to become more effective in our mission and ministry. So, I want to use this space to introduce you to our committees.

In the past, our ministry areas (or committees) were as follows: Welcome \& Evangelism, Worship, Fellowship, Christian Education, Missions, Buildings \& Grounds, Special Projects, Finance, Personnel, and History. That's ten different ministry areas needing Elder oversight and volunteer participation; that's quite a lot! So, what we did was reorganize responsibilities so that the number of ministry areas has been reduced to seven while still meeting all of our ministry needs and obligations. Without further ado, let me introduce you to our new committees:

First, our Missions Committee has been combined with Evangelism to form the

newly-minted Outreach Committee. This committee will be led by our elder, Gwen Harris, in the coming year. The purpose of this committee is to focus on reaching outside the walls of our church to help those in need and spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Therefore, they will be focused on helping locally, nationally, and internationally as well as connecting with our community in real and meaningful ways. If you have a heart for sharing the love of Jesus Christ with people who need Him, this committee is for you.

Second, our Fellowship Committee has been combined with Welcome to form the newly-minted Church Life Committee. This committee will be led by our elder, Judy Nason, in the coming year. The purpose of this committee is to foster a spirit of fellowship and friendship among everyone who attends our church. If the outreach committee is for outside our walls, the Church Life Committee is for inside our walls. This committee will organize the weekly fellowship time after worship, our bi-annual Inquirers' Class, and any other fun events/activities they can think up to strengthen our bond as brothers and sisters in Christ. If you have a heart for helping strengthen relationships within the church, this committee is for you.

Third, our Worship Committee has been combined with Christian Education to form the newly-minted Spiritual Growth Committee. This committee will be led by our elder, Suzanne Williamson, in the coming year. The purpose of this committee is to make certain that we are achieving our goal of fostering spiritual growth in our congregation through Sunday worship, Children's Church, and Bible studies. This committee will work very closely with our Director of Children's Ministries, Karla Reid, in making certain that program is running smoothly and successfully. They also will work closely with me in organizing Sunday morning worship. If you have a heart for fostering the spiritual growth of other believers, this committee is for you.

Fourth, Special Projects has been subsumed by our Buildings \& Grounds Committee. The Buildings \& Grounds Committee will be led by our elder, Betty Egan, in the coming year. The purpose of this committee is to make certain our wonderful campus and facilities stay in tip-top condition through regular maintenance as well as repairing anything that may come up. With an older facility like ours, there is always plenty to do to make certain things continue to run smoothly. If you have a heart for this campus and either some technical knowledge or the willingness to learn, this committee is for you.

## BOOK REVIEW

Don't Look Back<br>By Christine Caine

What was your disaster? Was it some past trauma? Physical or verbal abuse? Divorce? Loss of a loved one? COVID? Wars? Christine Caine's book, "Don't Look Back," brings some perspective about living in the wilderness of nightmares, and forgetting to move into God's purpose for the next era of our lives.

Jesus said in Luke 17:32, "Remember Lot's wife." Why? The context is a prophetic message about the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple around 70 AD. He warned his listeners that when you flee for your life, don't go back to get anything from your house. Just run for it. Lot's wife looked back and turned into a pillar of salt.

Christine Caine's examples came from the A21 refugee women and children, fleeing Ukraine before the border with Poland closed. Her A21 organization has 19 outposts in 16 countries, who rescue people who are trafficked around the world. One was in Kiev.

Why did Lot's wife look back? She had prestige in the city of Sodom. She had a fabulous home. Her husband was a rich, political person who sat at the gate of the city. God had granted that Lot and his family could live in the little village of Zoar. But as Lot's family fled from Sodom, his wife saw where she would live in poverty and have to start over again from scratch. She longed for the fancy clothes, her mansion, prestige and friends, and she looked back.
"Don't Look Back" is all about getting stuck in the past: Reliving WW II like my

dad; Retelling the story of abuse as a child like Joyce Meyer; Hanging on to the stuff from my grandmother, my sister, my brother, and my mother-inlaw after they passed. Their clutter still fills my closets and garage.

Caine mentions emotions where we might get stuck: "disappointment, unforgiveness, bitterness, offense, fear, guilt, anxiety, insecurity, indifference, apathy, comfort or complacency." Sometimes we keep going back over past issues and, like poking a snake, we keep getting "bitten," upset, worked up, depressed and lonely - no one wants to hear it after a while. We want to be light and salt to the world, not salt shakers frozen in time.

Christine refocuses us back to how Jesus handled the most painful part of his mission: "Jesus kept his focus on the joy that lay before him." Look ahead to find God's next joyous step in His plan for us.

Mourning is a season. Recovery takes time. But Caine says, "Mourning is not just reserved for when a person dies; it's for when
anything dies - a dream, a hope, a plan, a goal, a relationship, an expectation. It's for when anything changes that we weren't ready for."

She reassures us that "just because something has died, God's promises, plans, and purposes for my life have not . . . if we can separate the circumstances we're facing from God's overall purpose for our lives, then we can have the hope we need to keep moving forward." She says it depends on the circumstances of how long grief holds us.

A year after losing my dad, I went to our favorite restaurant, Sabella's in Marin County. I cried over the sesame seed French bread and filet of sole, and said, "Good bye." My grandmother had "memory keepers." These were objects around her living room that she'd touch, naming the person, and telling a story about them. Caine found that walking and appreciating God's creation restored her.
"Don’t Look Back" by Christine Caine is a great encouraging book and a wonderful read. Great for a Bible study. She makes you want to tell your stories, emphasizing how your healing process may help someone else heal.

Thank you for praying for the special elections for president and assembly members on August 20. The election day itself and the time since then has been peaceful, praise God. However, there was increased violence prior to the elections. One tragic incident was the assassination of the candidate leading in the polls. Please continue to pray for stability in the country and for a marked improvement in the employment situation. The runoff election between the top two candidates will be held on October 15.

The paperwork is being processed for the purchase of our new ministry home. We are hoping it will be finished in the next few days and that by midSeptember we can start planning the renovations that we will need to make for the broadcast and production studios. Thanks again for praying for this.

On August 21, I was part of a virtual training (via Zoom) for Radio Amistad
(Friendship) located in the Peruvian jungle town of Tarapoto. I participated with another colleague from Ecuador and a communications professor from Perú. There were over ten staff and volunteers from the station in the online class. One of the volunteers is from Guayaquil and her family listens to our station, so she was very excited to see someone from her hometown on the screen. We had a good discussion about the difference between radio programming for those who are already Christians versus content for seekers. Since the training, I've been listening to their programs to provide additional consulting and evaluation. The photo shows the Radio Amistad team watching us on the screen.

More training and consulting is on the calendar. I will be in Stockton, CA midSeptember to help with KYCC's fall onair fundraiser, and in October I will go to Abidjan, Ivory Coast to teach 5-days of training-for-trainers, then 2-days of teaching at the Africa by Radio Conference. I invite your prayers for my time of preparation, travel and teaching.

I know that I may sound like a broken record (for those who remember what those are!), but will you please keep praying for the funds still needed to buy the new console for our station. When I wrote last month, we had commitments for $92 \%$ of the total cost, but have not had any new donations since then. Thanks for praying for this.

What a privilege to walk and serve with you in the journey to take the name of Jesus Christ to the nations! Please have an incredible September!

## Finance News

The Semble 5-year loan review is upon us. It is the planned fiveyear review for our 10-year loan. This planned review period is to see how the church is doing and assure the individuals who provided funds that their money is safe.

One of the unique features of the Semble loan is that the families lending the money to the church are not known to the Finance Committee. All participation is confidential to Semble only. So, we would like to again thank all those families who have generously participated in the growing financial health of our church by their generous participation. It is hard to say thank you enough!

And there are several families that have generously lent funds to the church to help our church grow and be well maintained.

Previously I have written about all that was accomplished by the \$175,000 loan. We now have approximately $\$ 90,000$ remaining to be paid off on the loan. It is now estimated by our Finance Committee that the Semble loan will be paid off in the next three years. That will be an anticipated two-year early payoff.

To summarize, we have been stable, even in the difficult Covid time.

Our lease purchase for the new solar system is funded already with $\$ 61,000$ of the $\$ 91,000$ cost. The remainder of $\$ 30,000$ can be covered by an anticipated
\$27,000 funding by Covid Federal Grant funds. In short it is anticipated that all but $\$ 3,000$ of the solar cost will be covered at the present time. The solar savings should pay for its cost in less than three years, instead of paying our PG\&E bills. The solar system will freeze our electricity rates at 2023 rates for the next 15 years. That savings projected will be over $\$ 200,000$ at a minimum. Multiple bids projected far more savings than the \$200,000.

We finally fixed the Faith Hall roof, by removing the leaking sky lights and the cost was covered by church members in full.

And we have about another $\$ 25,000$ held in reserve as community engagement funds directed to church growth. Those funds are being held as already designated funds.

Many families, friends of the church, and individuals have worked hard, donated, and gifted to make all our financial wellbeing happen.

The church is doing well financially, but the remaining Semble loan is still needed until all this very busy financial time is over.

## From the Archives...

While browsing the archival materials of our church that were so kindly scanned by Pat and Ron Federly in about 20162018, I found an interesting report on this congregation in the mid-20th century. Following are excerpted paragraphs taken from the lengthy report prepared by the Christian Education Committee and presented to a meeting of the Stockton Presbytery on September 12, 1970. These excerpts talk mostly about the young people of the churchin the period between 1950 and 1970.

## Leslie Davis, History Committee

Along with the willing and eager ministers, were a devoted congregation. A congregation that in 1950 was called to the test, and answered courageously. The original building-having just been completely restored after three long years of work-was destroyed by fire! A time of disillusionment? For some maybe! But with ideas from the now growing youth element of the church, the disastrous fire brought the congregation
closer together, and a new spirit of enthusiasm plunged them into the immense project of planning and rebuilding an entire new church.

Of all the many donations and fundraising socials, the most unique idea for raising the needed money to rebuild came from the young people. As soon
as the burning embers had cooled, the teenagers salvaged over 200 square-cut nails. These nails, having been driven into the building some 50 to 85 years before, were mailed along with an appeal for money, to people throughout the country. Each nail was attached to a special letter which contained a picture of the historic church both before and after the fire. The response was immediate and overwhelming. Financial benefits from this endeavor were a great help in getting the new church on its way!

Within four years of the fire, the new church-a replica of the original-was ready for dedication. A special ceremony took place in December of 1954, just 100 years from the date of organization.


After the 1950 fire, youngsters presented their savings to the church.

Some of what the old church had was lost in the fire: the old bell that had been brought round the Horn in 1854; a Bible which had been used for over 50 years; and too, the manse which had served as a residence for many ministers and their families. But one thing was not lost! In fact, it was even strengthenedthat being the pioneering spirit of Christian love! That spirit just seems to be in the atmosphere. It's infectious, and whoever joins in the work of this congregation is susceptible to catching it.

Many years have gone by since that tragic fire. With the love and inspiration of Rev. Joseph Hillhouse; followed by the ten years of enthusiastically devoted service of Rev. George Crichton; and now through the guidance of our own Rev. Halsted Gates—the church has grown and changed, and is serving as a center of Christian witness to the community as well as to the many friends and visitors who seek solace in this quiet place of beauty.

Especially notable, with regard to church growth, is the fact that since Mr. Gates became pastor two years ago-the Session has added 99 new members to our rolls. Many of these members are active in various capacities, such as Sunday School teachers, choir members, Thrift Shop workers, and elders and deacons as well.

Each day brings new challenges to all of the church family: Perhaps it's the birth of a baby. Everyone will soon know by the red rose which is placed significantly on one corner of the pulpit. The rose is our way of welcoming a new baby. Along with the announcement rose, a small handmade doll is taken to the home as a gift from the church.

The services of our Cradle Roll Department started last November (1969). Each new child is followed through his first three years by means of home calls, and intermittent installments of a special packet on child spiritual guidance. At three years of age, the youngster is old enough to attend our youngest Sunday School class.

Up-to-date photographs of those children in the Cradle Roll are kept in a picture frame at the back of the sanctuary. In this way all church members can enjoy seeing the growth changes that each baby goes through.

There is always some activity being planned, or in progress, with the Sunday School. Just about everybody becomes involved in the annual Easter Egg Hunt for preschoolers, and the primary and intermediate grades. The fun of hunting colored eggs throughout the church grounds is combined with the "Chalk Talk" presentation of artist Mr. Homer Fey. Mr. Fey visualizes for the youngsters the true message Easter has to tell: When the day's events are over, the children are taking home new thoughts of a Christ that died for them-in addition to their usual thoughts of bunnies and baskets.

In the Spring, there is a Sunday School picnic for the entire family. A Rally Day Contest is held in the Fall, with prizes being given to those teams with the best attendance and most new guests; and then, of course, there is always a Christmas program too!

Summer isn't complete unless the church is ringing with the voices of approximately 100 children attending the daily Vacation Bible School. For one week, some thirty adult volunteers keep a very active group of boys and girls on-the-go with stories, songs, crafts, and Bible lessons. Started back in 1959 with 47 children, the number has now more than doubled.

In order to get this many children enthused and inspired to participate in the program, we sponsor a special Vacation Bible School Registration Parade. With improvised instruments of their own, the children meet at the church on the Saturday before the Bible School is to begin. Then all gaily march through the Main Street of old Columbia! We are highly successful in arousing everyone's attention, and in encouraging little folks all along the way to join in the fun.

The keynote of Jr. and Sr. High activities is fellowship! What greater horizons to explore than the mystery of themselves: the importance of their family and friends, and most especially of the
church in their lives. Special Fellowship Groups, one for each of the high school age levels, meet each Sunday evening throughout the school year for discussion, worship and companionship. The Jr. High Gang has been engrossed in studying a Christian Character course, plus games, handicrafts, and swimming; while the Sr. High Group has been studying the New Testament and topics which involve confrontation with today's life, plus projects involving the community.

Climaxing this year of study is the annual outing at Calvin Crest. A week in this beautiful mountain surrounding provides youngsters with spiritual renewal and fulfillment. Many years ago, with Mr. Crichton as leader, our church was instrumental in devising and advancing the Calvin Crest project. The importance of this camping experience is yet highlighted by the fact that the church pays one-half of the expenses for each young person attending. The always available, and ever helpful Women's Association and Mariners group assist substantially with this financing-a worthy endeavor for all the church to take part in!

There are a number of active study groups taught by various elders: including a Bible class for adults, a discussion group for young married couples and students from the new Columbia Junior College; and short, eight-week courses in Bible and Theology taught by the pastor, as well as church membership classes.

In closing, I wish to show you this white rose. It has a meaning as special as the red rose which announces a birth. For when one of our own has been called from our midst to the promises of a life beyond, time is taken to express one last honor, one special gesture of appreciation. A white rose is placed on the Sunday morning pulpit. It signifies a life well -lived, devoted in service to the Church of the 49ers, and now joined in rest with those ancestors who have gone before!
